

NOBEL PRIZE WINNER SPEAKS AT CENTURY CLUB OPEN MEET

WEST SLOPE—The newly formed Century Club, organized by Mrs. Vernon Churchill, is sponsoring an open meeting for the general public to be held at the Valley Community Church, on the evening of March 13, beginning at 8 o'clock.

An unusual speaker is booked for the event who will make an address on "The Disinherited," under the auspices of the American Friends of Oregon. She is Mrs. Leta Cromwell winner of the Nobel Peace prize two years ago, graduate of Bryn Mawr, and former drama critic of Forum Magazine. For the past three years, Mrs. Cromwell has been traveling in Europe and the middle East, visiting 15 countries in her travels.

Representing the American Friends Service committee, she observed conditions of present day Europe, and is now back in the United States to lecture on this topic. She has been much sought after as a speaker for various organizations and has made only three speaking dates in this section, of which the Century Club meeting is one. The meeting will be for the general public, although the club is primarily for women.

Mrs. Vernon Churchill, the originator of the unique club, stresses the idea that while smaller neighborhood clubs serve their purpose, much is to be gained by working with a larger group as well. The Century Club is open to women of all races and creeds and conditions of financial status.

The scope of the club is from Portland to Beaverton and adjacent communities. Already a great response is being made and the membership now numbers 60.

Future plans for the club include sections devoted to gardening, music, current events and current literature, language and philanthropy, with other sections added as needs indicate.

The next regular meeting of the

Century Club will be held at Gabel school on the afternoon of March 27, when a speaker will be Dean Collins of the Journal, who presents a surprise program, five rose bushes will be given as door prizes.

Mrs. Marshall Snyder, president of the Portland branch of the American Association of University Women will also speak as will Mrs. Wm. H. Bunney, president of the Portland Women's Club.

Mr. and Mrs. Hart received many gifts to add to their new home.



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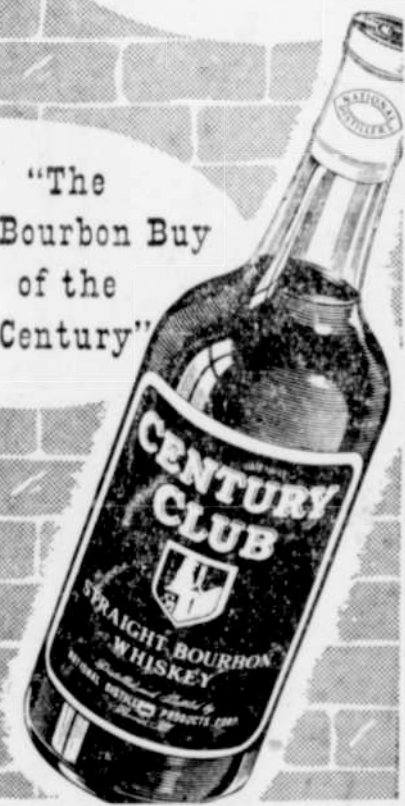
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
