

ACTIVITIES IN CEDAR MILL AREA

VOTERS APPROVE \$90,000 FOR IMPROVEMENT OF WATER DIST.

CEDAR MILL—Voters of the Wolf Creek Highway Water District approved the Board of Commissioners proposal of \$90,000 in bonds March 10, by a vote of 138 to 4.

Storage reservoirs, one near Cedar Mill of 500,000 gallon capacity and a smaller one of 200,000 at Bonny Slope, will be built to supplement supply of mains in the area.

The balance of the money will be used for construction of a 12 inch supply main from the reservoir at Cedar Mill and cross mains to distribute water thus equalizing the supply throughout the district.
