HUNTING & FISHING Around

A MOST FAMILIAR FLY

Didja know that the Royal Coachman, America's No. 1 fly was first tied in 1878 by John Hally, a New York flydresser. From its conception it gradually began climbing to the top, passing the Professor, Silver Doctor and Queen of the Waters, until it finally reached the top and stayed there.

Almost every fly fisherman has his favorite pattern. Believing it superior to all others he does very well with it, but the counter sales all over the nation certainly indicate a preference for the Royal "C".

Can it be that Hally's Coachman has the proper color combination, the desired amount of fish appeal or may we inject a bit of levity into the item and say "Ask the fish who strikes one."

CLEAR WATERS

Seems to us that the clarity of the water on the opening day of trout season is more important than the date, water or air temperature and water height. Regardless of how early the area's opening date occurs it is reasonably certain that trout will take wet flies in clear water and if the sun is shining you will have an even chance of taking them on dry flies.

In past seasons—have noticed that insects, dark in color, comprise the majority of the early hatch. For this reason the dark flies seem more productive and the lighter patterns come into their own around the 1st of June. The latter thought, however is merely an observation and cannot be regarded as a set rule....

AN OUNCE OF PREVENTION

There would be a lot less guys around after the close of the last years deer season moaning about the six or eight pointer that should have been in the bag. "I didn't even nick and I had a perfect bead on 'em", is the old cry. Now that's a sad lament that might be avoided if the guys would get in a little varmint hunting once in a while. Still-hunting for grey diggers, pursuing the reckless and speedy jack rabbits or stalking the wiry coyote are just a few ideas that provide worthwhile varmint sport and at least help the pre-season hunter sharpen up those hunting peepers for the opening big game date. Even gettin' out in the brush, just plunking around is good ground work.

Sighting in that deer rifle is another precaution that a lot of hunters fail to take—overlooking the fact that no factory firearm is made just for you....

OUTDOOR-INDOOR PASTIME

Those of you interested in securing information on the DO's and

DONT's of the great outdoor pastimes should take seriously the adds appearing in the hunting and fishing magazines. Catalogs, price lists, descriptive folders and "Helpful Hint Booklets" from sporting goods companies besides being colorful and interesting are chock-full of information about Where, Why and How... Most of 'em are for free and a letter or postcard requesting material will get a surprisingly prompt reply....

In a short while you'll have your own sporting goods catalog and many happy hour may be spent with family and friends—fishing and hunting within the confines of your own home....

FISH OF THE WEEK

It was during a mid-summer run of salmon and steelhead which, according to our records, occurred around the middle of July in the Columbia River near Bonneville Dam, that we became acquainted with a fighting rascal considered by most western anglers as trash-fish.

During this time of the year around the Bonneville area this infrequent visitor to fresh water streams is caught by the discriminating salmon and steelhead, fisherman; horsed in; quickly destroyed and thrown back in the stream or on the rocky shore.

When hooked his fight is similar to that of a Jack Salmon and very often is mistaken for such until he leaves the water in a silvery spray and the forked tail, a characteristic of the mackerel family stands out in bold outline.

Small spinners and wobblers are his favorite dish, although at times he will prefer a brightly colored fly, especially those with a tinsel body of silver or gold.

Played on a light outfit this finny critter ranks high in sport thrill and when fixed right is real eatin'. Next time out when the run is in try the scrappy Shad....

KNOTS TO YOU

The fisherman's knots are a most important part of his technique and yet in his haste to get that line in the water a careless knot is tied and as a result a hard earned fish is lost. Knots should be tested before casting and after playing a fish or snagging up, test before casting again. There is a proper knot for every kind of junction. (Some knots are tied in a manner that actually weaken the leader to one-half its original strength). Your score for the days angling will be much improved if care is exercised in avoiding the wrong knot at the right time.... (STILL NO NEWS OF THE THREE-SPINED STICKLEBACK).
