

PERSON TO PERSON GIFTS TO EUROPE SPURS WORLD RELIEF

WEST SLOPE — Europe needs the continuing aid of the Marshall plan in furthering its economic recovery but it is the person to person aid, administered by the workers of the various service committees which is building and strengthening the belief of the common man and woman of strident nations in the peaceful and humanitarian intent of the United States.

Such was the opinion expressed by Mrs. Leta Cromwell of Philadelphia, field worker of the American Friends Service Committee, when she spoke at the Valley Community Church Monday night, in the first of a number of free public events, presented by the Century Club for women. Mrs. Vernon R. Churchill, its president, presided.

"The industrial production of Europe this year will attain its 1939 level, declared Mrs. Cromwell, due to wise application of the Marshall plan and brilliant planning on the part of European economic and industrial leaders. But economic balance is still far in the future. The dollar gap remains, not because of politics, but because of the impoverishment of Europe, resulting from two world wars."

The American tourist who visits Europe today, gets an inaccurate picture of true conditions, because his dollars and their buying power form a tourist curtain which few get behind. Among millions of people on the continent today, want is still terrific. There is want of food, want of clothes and particularly want of work. Hopeless idleness, particularly among the displaced persons, both in Europe and the Middle East, and of the millions of expellees from Sudetenland, is one of the most challenging of the humanitarian and economic problems to be solved. Here are millions of people, mostly skilled, many highly cultured, cut adrift from old ties, kept alive in camps by meagre subsistence rations, unwanted in the areas where they have been placed by military or governmental action.

The United States is the only nation today which is talking about war. The explanation that the United States is afraid of Russia, is a hard one for most Europeans to understand and particularly those who know at first hand something of the terrific destruction of men and resources which Russia suffered in the last war.

In response to questions Mrs. Cromwell said need in Europe is very great for clothing and food. It is her belief that money given to any of the Service Committees or aid groups goes further in relief. The need for clothing among the displaced persons is particularly acute. In most demand is apparel for men and boys, babies and small children.

She assured her audience that such gifts made through any of the recognized Service Committees, would be efficiently distributed and would not reach black markets nor the unworthy. In this statement she was seconded by Emmett Gulley, Oregon director of American Friends Field Service, and a man of long experience in its work abroad.

He attended high school and then graduated from business college in St. Louis, Missouri. He worked in Marion, Indiana as a time keeper until enlisting, June 1917, in the 23rd Engineers.
