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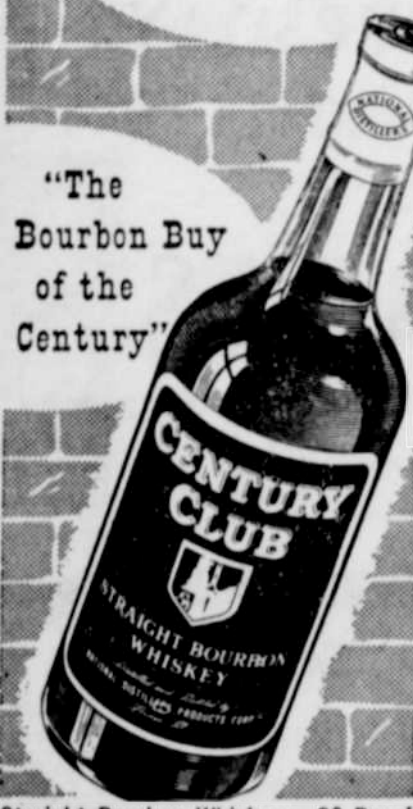

Thank you for publishing recent letter of mine. Here is another: on the zest to persecute.

It is strange that America founded by the pilgrim victims of persecution ("I will harry them out of the land", said King James) should itself become a land of persecution!

Judging by the rapid increase of various compulsions, prohibitions, uniformities, conformities ("loyalty test acts", etc.) to be sure primarily directed vs. "reds" we are repeating King James again.

What "red" can't take a "loyalty oath"? The worst feature is that anybody trying to exercise democratic freedom is immediately under suspicion as a "red"? Wonderful!

I am not saying that "bolshheviks" shouldn't be placed under certain coercive surveillance, but if anybody knows that average American, the bolshhevik attitude at least is not too foreign to him.

The big question here is "Why do the heathen rage and the people imagine a vain thing?" or why do they go into hysteria, frenzies, stampedes, phobia, etc.? What a long, ugly, cruel, stupid, record these have in history!

What is the source for this nasty phenomenon? Let us please not start blaming the BANKERS, LAWYERS, CAPITALISM, etc., and those other scapegoats of common parlance.

The real source lies endemically and residually within man himself, his prejudices, his absorbing egoism and self-regard.

Bertrand Russell hits the nail right on the head: "Every man would like to be God, if it were possible; some few find it difficult to admit the impossibility."

This undue self-devotion and deification of modern man and of all men in varying degree when multiplied into a nation, race, religion, etc., becomes a kind of absolutism and finality surpassing
