

Mother, Daughter, Teen-Agers Show Once Residents Die Same Week

Mrs. Helen McDonald Sander, 65, of Seattle, and Mrs. Mary Lou Sander Clough, 31, Shanghai, China, both former residents of the Aloha community, died in the same week, the mother on March 10 and the daughter March 5.

The Sander family lived in Aloha-Huber from 1925 to 1930 and were active in church and civic affairs. Mrs. Sander was born in Prineville, Oregon. She was a graduate of the University of Washington and a former trustee of the Seattle YWCA. She was active in the University Methodist Temple and a member of the PEO Sisterhood and Women's University club.

Surviving besides her husband are three sons, Donald L. William M., and Edward C. Sanders; two brothers, Superior Judge Donald A. McDonald and Ralph B. McDonald and eight grandchildren. Mrs. Clough, a native of Seattle, was the wife of Ralph Nelson Clough, member of the United States diplomatic service. Her husband was awaiting ship passage to Hongkong, where he had been assigned as consul, when his wife became ill of pneumonia.

A graduate of the University of Washington she was a member of the University Methodist Temple and the PEO Sisterhood.

Surviving besides her husband are two sons, Frederick William, and Marshall McDonald Clough, in Shanghai; her father and three brothers.

Teen-Agers Show Higher Accident Rate In Driving

Recent surveys and accident studies reveal that many Oregon parents are allowing their high school teen-agers to drive the family car without an operator's permit, the state traffic safety division reported today.

While this may be due to a mistaken belief that only parental permission is needed to legalize a minor's use of the car, the division warned that parents may be overlooking other and more important considerations as well.

Officials pointed to the following facts which parents of young drivers should keep in mind:

1. Teen-agers have a higher rate of severe accidents per mile driven than any other age group.
2. A greater percentage of their accidents involve negligence or law violation, which may readily form a basis for civil damage suits in which the parent may be held liable.

3. A parent's liability insurance normally does not cover a son or daughter driving a car belonging to another person or to the teenager himself. Young drivers frequently exchange cars without thought for these troublesome considerations.

The safety division suggested parents should see that young drivers receive proper instruction and continuous supervision of driving habits. High school driving courses are recommended where available. No solo driving should be permitted until the license is obtained and insurance protection checked to see if a new driver in the family will render it useless.

Census Bureau In Survey Of Farms Has 100 Queries

The United States Bureau of the Census is preparing for a large mailing job in connection with the 1950 Census of Agriculture for more than six million farmers are on the mailing list.

Late in March every rural route boxholder will receive an agriculture questionnaire which he will be requested to fill and have ready for the census taker when he calls at the farm in April during the Seventeenth Decennial Census of the United States.

The questionnaire to be used in the 1950 Census of Agriculture has been designed so as to be filled out as easily as possible. The average farmer will answer less than 100 inquiries, most of which can be completed without reference to any records.

About one-half of the inquiries on the Agriculture Questionnaire apply to all farms in all sections of the country. Of the inquiries regarding approximately fifty kinds of field crops, vegetables, and fruits, the average farmer will answer less than a dozen since, generally, he will have produced only four or five different crops.

For crops harvested in 1949, the farm operator will be asked to report the acreage, yield, and value of the crops sold or to be sold. Livestock inventories will be reported as of April 1, 1950 while inquiries for the production of livestock and livestock products refer to the 1949 calendar year.

To further simplify the questionnaire, a special form will be used for nearly every State, listing only the crops principally grown by the farmers in that State.

The information which farmers supply to the Census Bureau is confidential and can not be used for taxation, investigation, or regulation.

Dangerous Cattle Disease Appears To Be Spreading

Veterinary authorities warned cattle owners to be on the lookout for leptospirosis, a dangerous cattle disease which first appeared in this country six years ago and appears to be spreading.

Symptoms of the disease vary so widely that cows may be stricken without the owner's knowing it, an American Foundation for Animal Health bulletin reports, but sudden illness, loss of appetite, fever, depression and thick milk are all suspicious signs.

Owners may think some light cases are only indigestion, particularly since the cow may recover without serious illness. In other cases, however, the disease strikes hard, killing many animals.

Recovered animals may act as disease carriers for a considerable length of time, so even 'light' cases may be dangerous.

The only sure way of determining if leptospirosis is present is through blood tests and isolation of the disease-causing organism. If cattle owners suspect an outbreak of the disease, they should obtain a veterinary diagnosis immediately, since the sooner blood transfusions and medical treatment are started, the better the chance of saving the affected animals and preventing the disease from spreading.

Keeping barnyards well drained and free of sharp-edged stones helps to prevent foot rot in cattle and sheep.

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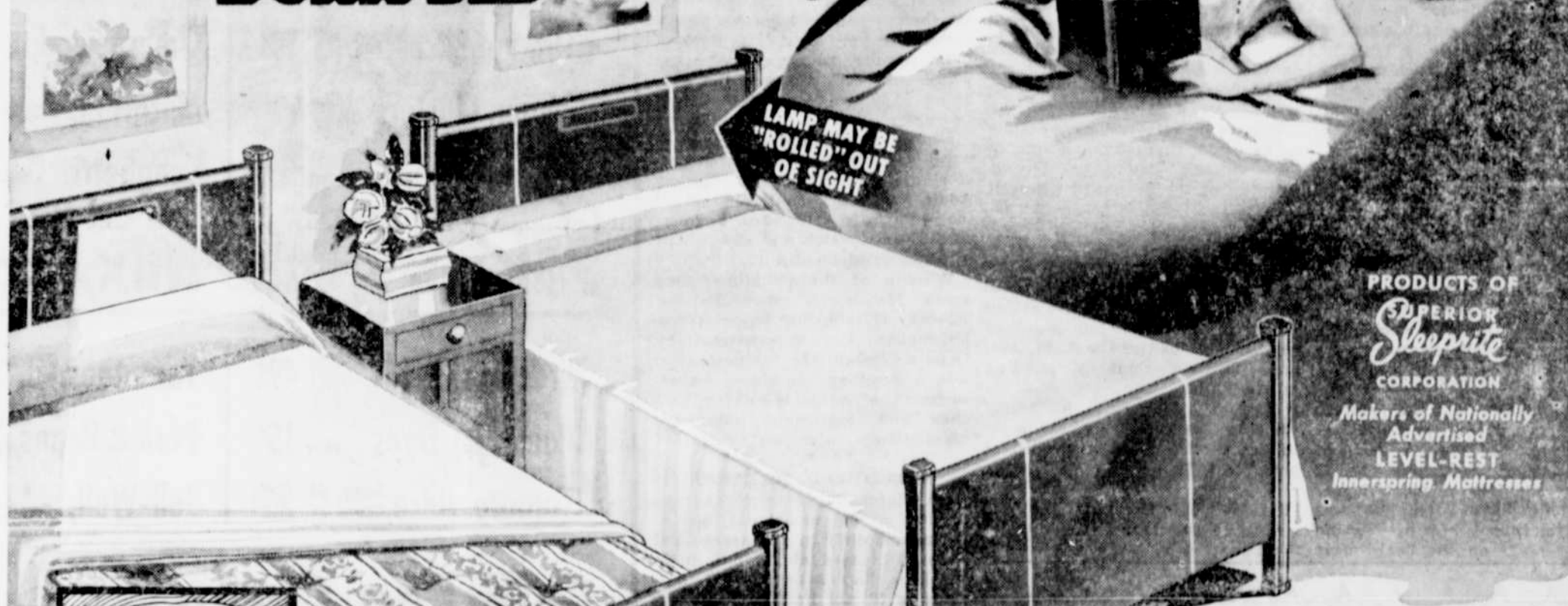
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
