Jackson, subject of a coast-to-coast newspaper feature and "Wanted" dodgers distributed thru the U. S. post offices, was said to be dangerous.

Nabbed by the FBI without incident, Jackson scoffed at the report he was "dangerous," showing by a detailed log of his activities since escape that he had made good on his own, without a bit of trouble.

Friends and neighbors, who knew him as Kenneth James Van Kemper during his residence of over a year in the Tualatin valley, have rallied under the leadership of "Cy" Kirkland, Jackson's last employer, to intercede in behalf of the captured man.

Jackson's record in Leavenworth was reportedly without a black mark, during eleven years' time. During the war, he was co-inventor of a bomb sight, three parts of which were reportedly used by the U. S. government during the last war.
