Poultry Program Looms Larger In 4H Club Activity

Based on the increasing popularity of the National 4-H Poultry Achievement program, 4-H'ers should top their last year's record of raising a total of 8,000,000 chickens, turkeys, ducks and geese. Likewise the enrollment figure is expected to pass the 150,000 mark reached in 1949.

County Extension Agents and local 4-H Club leaders work with the youth, instructing them in newest methods and approved practices used in poultry and egg production.

Members are encouraged to carry out the six main objectives of the program which briefly are: learn the place of poultry in the economy of the farm; acquire skill in poultry raising; assist in production of eggs and fowl to provide adequate supplies for food; appreciate the nutritive value of eggs; learn to grade and market poultry products; study scientific developments and apply the knowledge to home flock production.

The 4-H'ers carefully keep records showing production of birds and eggs, and also general achievements in other phases of Club work. At the end of the year these records are judged for special honors which will again be provided by Dearborn Motors, program sponsors.

Five sterling silver medals will be presented to winners in each county; a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago for the state winner; and college scholarships of \$300 each to the 10 national champions.

The program is under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

Less Money But Plenty Work Is Farming Outlook

Oregon farmers will probably pocket less money from the 1950 harvest of truck crops and potatoes than they did last season, but market prospects in general are still fairly favorable, believes M. D. Thomas, OSC extension economist.

Reduced acreage allotments and support prices still important in the potato situation. Processors are not expected to contract snap beans or sweet corn as freely as in 1949 but may take a few more acres of green peas if weather conditions favor a long planting season.

Lettuce may be a better bet than onions in adapted areas of the state, although both could be easily over-produced. Market conditions for other truck crops depend greatly on amounts produced, as demand is not expected to be greatly different from other recent years.

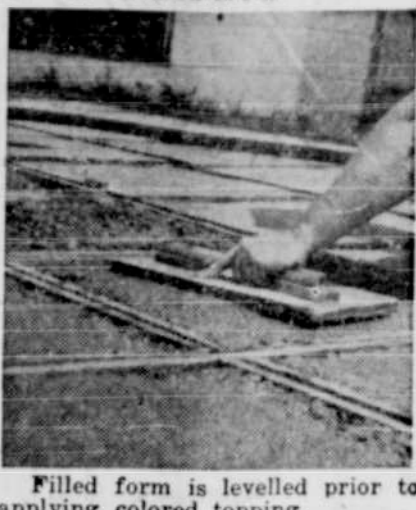
Commercial potato growers in the state are being asked to reduce their plantings by 2,800 acres or 8½ percent. Growers have been advised of individual allotments which must not be exceeded if they wish to be eligible for the government price support program. Chances for market prices above support levels next fall and winter are not good unless national acreage allotments are met and yields are somewhat lower, Thomas says.

A large spring onion crop moving to market in competition with remaining old stocks has demoral-

How to Make a Terrace



Greased form, set on levelled ground, is filled with concrete.

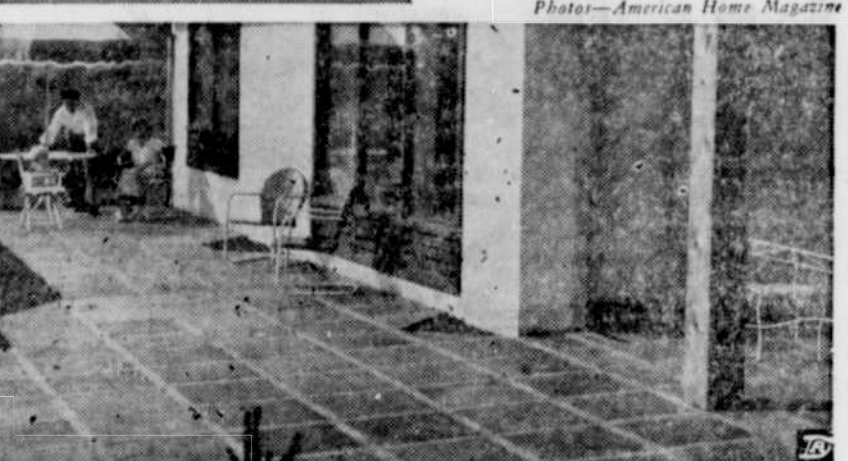


Filled form is levelled prior to applying colored topping.



A tablespoon of plaster color, sprinkled on each square is troweled into concrete surface (left).

When form is set, (above) remove frames and pour mortar into joints.



The terrace, above, is made from a form made of sixteen 22-inch squares. No extra preparation of ground is required. Squares are filled with concrete colored with plaster colors to individual taste. Described in detail in the March issue of American Home Magazine, it costs 8 cents a square foot, and a minimum of work to complete.

ized the onion market recently. If in 1949 brought growers about 6½ million dollars. This was nearly three times the average return for the last ten years. Processors also paid Oregon growers more than \$3,000,000 for the 1949 crop of peas and around \$1,500,000 for sweet corn.

Altogether, Oregon's 1949 production of truck crops was worth around \$22,000,000 to growers. Potatoes added approximately \$17,000,000 additional.
