"Tourists" Reach County Jail For Stolen Gas Try

A party of six "tourists" from Eugene, on March 30, reached the county jail in Hillsboro, after an attempt to steal gasoline from a '49 Ford coupe, 1 block north of Reedville store. Henry Mayfield, Beaverton chief of police, made the nab, with an assist from the city's newly installed radio-telephone installation.

Catherine Gregory, owner of the car, noticed two of the party inserting a hose into the gas tank of her car, about 11 p. m. She and her sister charged out, at which time of events the gas seekers took to their heels and zoomed away in their own car. The pursuer noted the license number, which is accredited to one Jack E. Schmidt, now said to be held in Multnomah county jail for the FBI.

Report was flashed to the county sheriff's office, which in turn broadcast the information. Mayfield and state patrol officer William Radosevich made the nab.

Apprehended were Russel Frederick Bradley, age 26; Richard LeJames, 23; two boys aged 18, one aged 17 and a girl aged 16. The girl is on parole.

One of the six explained they had come to Portland intending to bail out Schmidt but had run out of money on the way. Upon reaching Portland, they intended to steal some gasoline but couldn't find a likely source.

They took out Canyon road, stole a grease can and water hose at a Hillsboro service station and then returned to Reedville where the futile attempt was made.

They came into the arms of the law on Broadway street, in Beaverton.

For the escapade, penalty of \$25 fine and 30 days in jail was handed out.

For a while they were in partnership in a sawmill near Estacada.

In 1906 they purchased a farm near Aloha where they lived for many years.

She is survived by four sons: Hubert J., Glenn W., and Mireal R., of Aloha, and George C., of Seal Beach, California; three brothers and two sisters: George Hughson, Beaverton, Walter Hughson, Tillamook; Louis Hughson, Newport; Mrs. Hattie Pitt of Portland and Mrs. Lea Johnson, Portland, and seven grandchildren.
