There will be one bicycle given for every five workers who become active in the campaign, and four cash commissions. No less than five bicycle prizes will be given. Those not receiving bicycles will be paid a cash commission equal to 20 per cent of all money they have turned in for subscriptions during the campaign.

SIMPLE RULES

The campaign territory will be divided into three districts. Candidates living in the Aloha area will be in district number one. Candidates living in the Multnomah area or any other district outside the city limits of Beaverton will be in district number two, and those candidates living in Beaverton City will be in district number three. The candidates living in each district who finishes the campaign with the most votes of any candidate in his own district will receive the Capital Prize Bicycle for his particular district. After the District Capital Prize Bicycle have been awarded, the other bicycles will be awarded to the candidates in any district having the next highest vote standings.

No employee or near relatives of any employee in the business office of this newspaper is eligible to enter the campaign. Correspondent families will be allowed to compete. Children under 16 must have written consent of parents or guardian.

In event of a tie for any of the prizes each candidate will be given a prize identical in value.

A bonus of 2000 votes will be given each candidate turning in 3 or more subscriptions on the opening day of the campaign, and an additional 3000 extra votes will be given to the candidate turning in the most subscriptions. These same bonus votes will be given for the report days of Wednesday, April 19, Saturday, April 22 and Wednesday, April 26.

To insure absolute fairness the campaign will be brought to a close under the sealed ballot box system. All subscriptions and money collected the last three days of the campaign must be in the sealed ballot box when the campaign ends on Saturday, May 6.

Votes will be issued on both new and old subscriptions. Credit for all extra votes will be issued at the convenience of the campaign manager.

No candidate will be allowed to transfer votes or subscrip-

tions to another candidate, but with the consent of the Campaign Manager a candidate may transfer his or her votes to an entirely new worker.

Candidates collecting more than the one subscription required to qualify his nomination before the opening day will be barred from the campaign. To be considered active each candidate must turn in at least two subscriptions on each Saturday and Wednesday during the campaign which will be known as report days. Candidates living outside Beaverton may bring or send their Saturday report on Mondays and their Wednesday's reports on Thursdays except the last report which must be in on the closing day.

All candidates are positively required to hand in all the subscriptions they have on each report day.

Prizes must be won in accordance with the conditions of the campaign and no candidate will be promised a certain prize for so many subscriptions or so much money.

Workers are not confined to their own town or neighborhood in which to get subscriptions, nor to any one newspaper. All candidates can sell subscriptions to any of the three papers.

Cash must accompany all subscriptions when votes are desired. The management reserves the right to add to these rules for the protection of this newspaper and the candidates. There will be one prize bicycle and four cash commissions for each five candidates in the campaign but no less than five bicycles will be awarded.

The candidate having the highest number of votes will get first choice of the bicycles, the second highest the next choice, etc., until all bicycles have been chosen. Winners will get their choice of boys' or girls' models. Bicycles will be awarded the closing night of the campaign. Those winning commissions will have checks mailed not later than the following Tuesday.

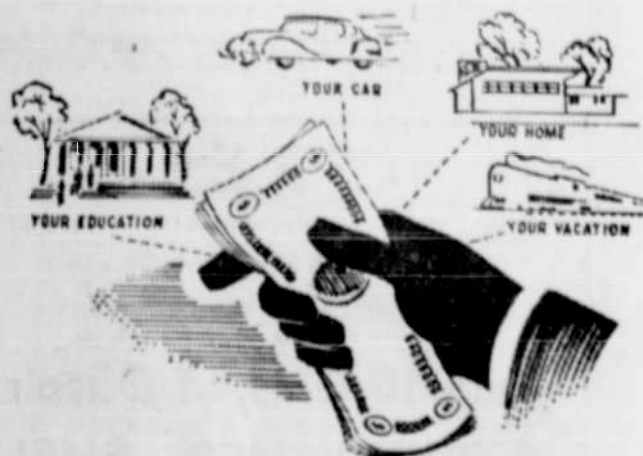
