Early Resident Tells of Strange Flaming Objects

On his annual revisit to Beaverton, early this week, George W. Baker, 111 SW Morrison, Portland, reports having recently seen a strange flaming object knifing through the skies in the direction of Beaverton.

It was about 1:30 Sunday afternoon, March 19, that Baker sighted the phenomenon. It seemed to be a burning ball, followed by a trailing tail about 100 feet long of what appeared to be black smoke.

He doesn't know what it was and is even reluctant to name it a flying saucer.

On April 2, on the front page of the Sunday Oregonian, George had his picture printed to illustrate a story on the census enumeration. He relates that he will be 88 next December 13 and is going strong.

Born in Iowa, near what is now Waterloo, in 1862, he left with his parents for Beaverton, at the age of 4. His son, Jesse S., who accompanied him on his annual trip to renew his subscription, was born in 1893, on Kings Lane near Beaverton, in a house that is still standing.

As an evidence of his present-day affluence, Baker flashed a \$1,000 bill—issued on the Chinese National Republic and on the basis of yuans.
