## Job Openings on Farms Respond To Dry Weather

Agricultural placements in Washington county will depend upon the continuation of dry, sunny weather, according to Ben W. Scott, farm placement representative of the Oregon State Employment Service at Hillsboro. As long as the sun stays out, he adds, placements will be at a high volume.

Minimum farm work pay is 75c an hour for seasonal work.

Scott would like to have job seekers file their applications at the Hillsboro office on Second St., or at the Farm Labor Camp, situated at Hillsboro's east city limits.

Employers are advised that good qualified, year-round workers are listed by the office. Migrant workers are beginning to arrive in numbers and their need for summer housing is nearing the acute stage. Farmers with living quarters for workers are advised to call Scott.

Job placements over the last three weeks have been good, much higher than at this time last year, Scott reports. Around 500 seasonal placements were lined up for the first day of sunny weather.

## Beaverton Merchants Back Baseball Program By Cash

Baseball fans in the east end of Washington county will have Pee-Wee and Cub teams to root for this summer, with announcement from Beaverton and Tigard that uniforms and equipment for the youngsters will be assured, according to Errol Hassell, in charge of the program.

Six leagues in the Northwest area of the state are planned with

teams from many communities. Pee Wees are boys of twelve years and younger while Cub baseball takes in boys thirteen and fourteen.

"Hobe" Vermilye, of Vermilye Motors, Tigard, has agreed to outfit youngsters in his community while 27 business firms of Beaverton have donated for teams in this city.

The Beaverton program will be under the direction of Hassell, assisted by Dean L. Jones, Ralph Nelson and others yet to be named.

Last summer was the first for Pee-Wee baseball in this area, with formation of the Suburban League. The program was so successful that twenty-eight communities are participating this summer. Cub baseball has been added to take care of boys not quite ready for Junior American Legion play.

Beaverton Cubs and Pee-Wees will play against Hillsboro, Tigard, Forest Grove, St. Mary's Home for Boys and Bashor's of Portland. League champions will enter a district playoff and plans include a state championship series to be played in the Vaughn street diamond of the Lucky Beavers.

Games are scheduled for Monday nights. Beaverton's first game will be played on the home field, June 5, against Bashor's.
