## HUNTING & FISHING Around

A few anglers during the early days of trout season pioneer artificials—the majority don't. Voluntes have been written about flies not scoring early in the season, especially dry flies.

Now if ya ask the crafty little cutthroat, he'll say, "Why give me a little spinner and juicy yellow buck tail any day and if ya aint got that I'll take a red and white buck or even a plain 3/0 or 4/0 Colorado". Of course that's so much fin chatter but the records speak for themselves.

In the lakes a small red and white daredevil type wobbler is dynamite. Not many anglers in the Northwest are acquainted with this lure. Small bottled minnows properly harnessed work very well in almost all lakes.

Don't spend too much time waiting for the dry fly to connect—it isn't likely right now that the streams will be clear enough, and the weather warm enough to produce an insect hatch.

But if (There's always an if) it is exceptionally warm and there is a hatch—who knows maybe ya might get a rise or two.

The small willow leaf is an ideal spinner for the fly rod and light spinning rod, being drag free even in fairly heavy riffles.

The most humble lure of them all to offer any fish is nothing at all, or almost nothing—its just a bare hook. The finny dodo who regards this modest offering a most suitable subject for striking is the Herring. He's not a game fish by any stretch of the imagination but its great sport to land 3 or 4 of these critters at one time on an average bait casting outfit time after time when schools are in the area by virtue of a half dozen bright gold or silver hooks (No. 6) secured to leader and pre-

ceeded by a small spinner. Perhaps the bare hooks resembles a desirable part of the Herring's diet. (They are usually hooked in the mouth).

Next time ya get a chance to do a little bay fishing try the Herring. He may not be very game but he is tasty and a few 10 inches properly prepared are kings fare.

"Oh where, Oh where, has our little fish gone", is the sad lament of this years Sandy River smelt dippers. Poor guys (dippers—not the smelt) don't seem to have much of a chance to grab-a-few anymore this year.

According to a recent Oregon State Game Commission bulletin, the smelt by-passed practically once in every 3 years for the past 30 years.

1947 was the last smeltless year on the Sandy River.

Charles Lockwood, State Game Director declares that although unproven as yet, it was a possibility that stream conditions, especially temperature, affect the smelt's spawning habits and the temperamental runts may spawn in the main Columbia River if tributary conditions aren't satisfactory.

Some of the waters that have produced fairly good trout fishing for the early part of the season are Eagle Creek; not far from Estacada and which incidentally might have a steelhead or two, the Clackamas River (steelie also, maybe?) part of the upper Willamette (check the state anglers guide closely on this for open waters). Yamhill River, is not too high or muddy and the Tualatin River, (Maybe a bass, Huh?).

A little later when the winter snows run off, and the weather warms up, the Salmon River, Upper Sandy River, Still Creek, and various Mt. Hood waters produce fair catches.

After plastering both inside and out, the flooring and ceilings will be put in. The top floor will be completed first, as the ground is not dry enough to pour the cement for the first floor.

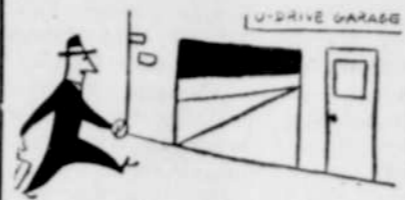
Heating and electricity have already been installed.

**QUESTION:** I am a salesman and I use my car in business. How do I obtain insurance which would enable me to pay for renting another car if mine was stolen? I'm referring to the period from loss of the car till it was either recovered or the company settled for the loss.

**ANSWER:** The standard auto theft policy provides for reimbursement not to exceed five dollars per day for rental of a substitute car. Total payment for this purpose not to exceed one hundred fifty dollars or the cash value of the stolen car.

## Mental Marvel Masters Man's Mind Miracles

Dr. Franz J. Polgar, acknowledged master of telepathy, hypnosis and other psychic phenomena, is to speak before the Washington County Knife and Fork Club on Thursday evening, April 20, at the Peter Boscow school, Hillsboro, according to Leonard Adams, president. His subject will be: "Miracles of the Mind".

Before coming to America he was a criminologist with the Hungarian secret police, and treated neurotic cases in Budapest hospitals. He is a graduate of the University of Budapest, but Dr. Polgar admits he did not obtain his unusual mental and psychic powers through his studies of psychology.

Polgar lays no claim to the supernatural, yet his work transcends common experience and defies explanation. He believes most persons utilize only a tithe of their natural mental power.

"I don't know how I can do it", he told the science editor of the New York World Telegram, "Once in the war, I was buried alive for three days. After that, hospitals for six months. I had aphasia and amnesia. I even was so bad I lost all memory and could not speak or write. After they got me out of it I found I had this ability to understand the thoughts which others are trying to say to me."

Although widely considered a superb showman with the ability to break the fever of suspense with which he holds his audiences by his quick wit and unexpected pranks, Dr. Polgar's basically scientific presentation of powers of the mind has baffled scientists and yet convinced the most skeptical in his tests of thought transference.

Dr. Polgar studied under Professor Sandor Ferenczi at the University of Budapest, and was one of the first pupils of Sigmund Freud, master psychologist.
