### HOOVER REPORT BLASTS IDEA OF TAX WASTE SPEAKER SAYS

CEDAR MILL—The "Hoover Report" was explained to members of the community club April 12 in a talk by Robert Welch, a member of the Portland chamber of commerce.

Mr. Welch charged that the federal government expenses are excessive due to duplication and mismanagement. The Hoover report recommends regrouping government agencies, adoption of modern bookkeeping procedures and reform of existing personal standards to attract equipped individuals.

He urged the support of individuals and clubs to the proposal.

### RURAL SCHOOL DISTRICT ELECTION NOTICE

Notice of School Election in the Rural School District of Washington County, Oregon. Upon Question of Increasing Tax Levy Over Amount Limited by Section 11, Article XI, State Constitution.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in the District Schoolhouse, May 15, 1950, by the Rural School District of Washington County, State of Oregon, in all component school districts of said Rural School District.

The election will be from 5 to 9 P. M. (Daylight Saving Time) and will be held in the schoolhouse in each of said component districts. The purpose of the election is to submit to the legal voters of the rural school district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1950, over the amount limited by Section 11, Article XI of the Constitution.

The reasons for increasing such levy are to provide necessary school funds.
