County Sets Up Dist. To Control Weeds Nuisance

Legal establishment of a county weed control district, April 21, has set in motion a determined effort to eradicate and prevent the re-seeding of certain noxious weeds, particularly Canadian thistle, tansy ragwort and Irish broom or gorse or furze.

C. W. Spiering has been appointed county weed inspector and will serve until the appointment of his successor by the county court.

Thistle and tansy are objectionable when mixed with cattle feed. Tansy is blamed by many cattle and dairymen for loss of animals by poisoning. Although the weed is not heavily concentrated in the county, there are some patches which, if allowed to naturally re-seed, would present a major threat to the dairy industry.

Irish broom is reportedly an extreme fire hazard. Highly inflammable, it is said to burn like gasoline and is moderately heavily concentrated.

Under Production and Marketing Administration rules, up to 50% of chemical costs may be repaid from weed-killing operations.

Memorial tribute to W. E. Pegg, oldest active mortician in the state of Oregon, who passed away April 24 after a short illness, has been asked by Mayor H. H. Jeffries, by proclamation which requests all stores in Beaverton to close during the hour for his funeral on April 27, 3 p. m., in Pegg's Chapel, Beaverton.

Dr. John G. Mitchell, of Central Bible church, will officiate. Vault entombment will be in Riverview Abbey Mausoleum.

Mr. Pegg was born April 12, 1870, in Calumet, Wisconsin. He was married to Della W. Strain, October 3, 1891, at Marietta, Minnesota, and they came to Oregon 43 years ago. They celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary in 1941. He observed his 80th birthday on April 12th, just prior to his last illness. He enjoyed that day because of the many good wishes extended to him.

He was a member of Beaverton Lodge No. 100, A. F. & A. M., Beaverton Lodge No. 256, I. O. O. F., the Central Bible Church, Portland; ex-mayor of Beaverton for two terms; a past president of the Oregon Funeral Directors Association.

He is survived by his wife, Della W. Pegg; four daughters, Hazel Paxson, Beaverton, Edna Hughes of San Francisco, Thelma Berg of Portland, and Thelma Etheridge of Los Angeles; two grandchildren, Elwin Paxson and Dolores Towers; and a great grandson, Dod Vincent Towers. A son, Harold Pegg, died in 1948.

Fanno Crossing Takes Life; Car Train Collision

A car and locomotive collision at Fanno crossing, on highway 217 near Progress, claimed the life of George Zolgar, 31, Rte. 2, Sherwood, April 24. Death was instant as the auto crashed into the engine estimated to be traveling 20 miles an hour and was torn to pieces by the driver's wheels.

Engineer Stacey Hendricks and Conductor E. B. Fair, both of Portland, reported to state police that they saw a carload of juveniles speeding just ahead of Zolgar's car. They believed the locomotive was going to hit that car but the car escaped before a crash.

Zolgar, part owner of the Powhatan Lumber company at Newberg, was born at Tonasket, Wn., and had lived in the Tualatin valley about eight months. He is survived by his wife and five year old daughter, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Zolgar, Sr., one brother and five sisters.

The body was to be shipped to Tonasket on Thursday for burial. No services will be held here.

Residents living north of the accident scene, according to reports, told police the car containing the juveniles passed Zolgar's car and that then the two vehicles seemed to be racing toward the crossing.
