

V.A. Says GI Loans Increase Due To Loosening Money

Funds available to World War II veterans for G.I. loans are expected to remain plentiful during 1950, according to the Veterans Administration. The VA said the American people are saving at the rate of 13 billion dollars a year, providing a ready source of loanable mortgage funds.

A number of factors, the VA said, assure that available mortgage money will go to G.I. loans and not to other purposes.

First, while the supply of loanable funds grows, the demand for investment money by business is

declining. The postwar expansion boom in manufacturing plants and equipment has passed.

Secondly, yields on government and high-grade corporation bonds has declined substantially so that lending institutions have become less inclined to invest in bonds and more interested in making G.I. loans which yield a return of 4 per cent.

Two million veterans have made use of their G.I. loan privilege in purchasing homes, farms and businesses, the VA reported, and it is expected that two million more will obtain G.I. loans before the program expires July 25, 1957.

The VA emphasized that veterans should make their applications for G.I. loans directly to a lending institution and not to the VA.

Census Rolls On Ahead Of Plans; Tabulation Due
Census operations in this district are ahead of schedule. Lyman Ross district supervisor, stated today despite some areas in the five county district where roads are still impassable.

"In behalf of our staff and especially the census field crews I want to thank the people of this district for their fine cooperation and assistance in helping us maintain our schedule," Mr. Ross stated.

Most of the urban districts have been enumerated or will have been by the end of this week and the rural areas are well under way. Editing and tabulating of completed portfolios has begun in the district office in Astoria and some preliminary figures may be available in a few weeks.

As a whole, the five county district comprising Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill counties has been free from any serious incidents as far as enumerators are concerned, Ross stated.

He said one report had been received that an enumerator had been bitten by a dog, one had trouble questioning a mentally unbalanced person, and a few "rugged individuals" were encountered. One reported having the door slammed in her face and several had to walk a number of miles in muddy roads and trails to enumerate the household.

Impassable roads in some of the out of the way places may delay the count in some areas for several weeks, Ross stated.

The answers to everyday insurance problems*

QUESTION: What advantage if any, is there in carrying "comprehensive" insurance on a car? The insurance company makes certain exceptions for which it will not be liable but assumes responsibility for just about any other form of damage. Even stains, damage from falling objects and glass breakage are covered under this policy.
