Rural Neighbors Day Bids Farmers and Business Men

TOUR OF COUNTY FARMS MAY 2 DEMONSTRATES AGRICULTURE DEVELOPMENTS AND PRACTICES

Farmers and business men of Washington county are especially invited to attend the rural neighbors' visitation day of May 2, when the public is invited to assemble 9:30 a.m. in Hillsboro, for a one-day tour of five county farms, three of them in the eastern end of the county. Civic organizations, county banks and the office of the county agent, Palmer Torvend, are cooperating on details of the event.

From the beginning point, on First street between Baseline and the Carnation company in Hillsboro, the group will view the dairy farm of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Schoenbachler at Iowa Hill, south of Cornelius.

Here will be demonstrated the methods of erosion control, the maintaining and increasing of soil fertility and the elimination of annual cropping. Comparison of results between barnyards, commercial and the combination of these two fertilizers will be pointed out as well as the process and equipment necessary for making grass silage.

The Schoenbachlers have 20 cows in milk and 12 heifers. Members of the Dairy Herd Improvement Association and taking part in the Washington County Dairy Breeders' Association artificial insemination program, they offer an example of these two dairy management practices.

Stop number two will be at the Frank Erickson-A. F. Vandeschuer poultry farm, near Laurel. A 28-acre establishment which combines a hatchery and an egg-production business, this visit will offer views of poultry ranges,

poultry housing and the processing of fresh eggs for market.

The results of contour terracing on a badly eroded field, put into effect in 1949, will feature the visit to the Fred Pleith farm near Tigard, on Bend road. Thirty acres have been treated, by installation of 4800 feet of sod waterways and 6800 feet of terraces.

Pleith has farmed near Tigard most of his life and cultivates 150 acres of oats, vetch, sweet red clover, potatoes, rye grass, subterranean clover and alta fescue.

At this stage of the tour, free noon luncheon will be provided by the banks of the county for all

who participate.

In the afternoon, dairymen interested in milking parlors will have an opportunity to see a modern five-cow elevated milking parlor at the dairy farm of Hubert and Orville Dierly, at Kinton. The parlor has been in operation for three years, although the Dierly brothers have been operating since shortly after 1940.

A modern Grade A dairy operation, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Rupprecht near Rosedale, will conclude the tour. Here, the advantages of a milking parlor may be compared with a milking barn.

The Rupprechts have a new 20 cow milking barn and milk house of concrete blocks. Their 60 acre farm is devoted principally to dairying, although Mrs. Rupprecht conducts a supplemental poultry operation with about 300 laying hens.

An item of particular interest to farmers will be the 18,000 gallon

liquid manure tank with a special Swiss pump to resist corrosion, and a specially built spreading tank. Everyone is invited in this tour, to get acquainted with the Washington county agricultural industry. Businessmen from Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Beaverton, Aloha, Tigard and Sherwood have been invited to attend.

CATTLE OUTNUMBER STATE DAIRY COWS

"Oregon's Dairy Industry Agricultural Statistics 1947, 1948, and 1949", just released by OSC, show tables which indicate that beef cows two years of age and older outnumber milk cows of the same age group 320,000 to 238,000. The figures are for January 1, 1949.

In the period 1940 to 1944, the circular states there were 275,000 dairy cows as compared with 264,000 beef cows two years of age and older, indicating the beef industry is on the rise.

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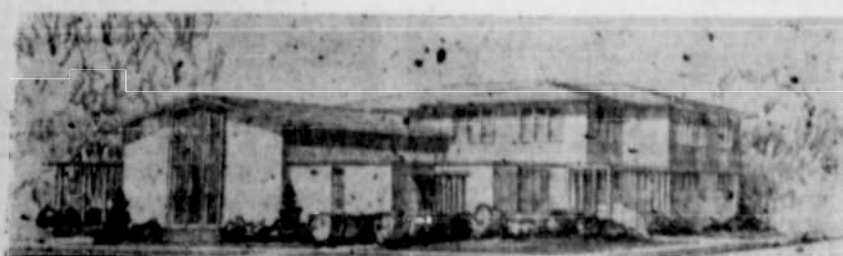
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
