

Sophs Win Inter-Class Meet; Two Records Topped

By edging out the seniors 55 to 54, the sophomore class won the annual inter-class track meet last Friday. The sophs scored 38 points in boys' division and 17 in girls to take the meet.

Although the seniors scored 48 points to win boys' division, lack of girl participants gave seniors only 6 points, two short of victory. Only two records were broken in the 16 events. Murray Bartley cut 10.5 seconds off the 880 as he ran the course in 2:16.5 minutes. Melvin Mori jumped 18' 3" to break the old broadjump mark by nearly 5 inches.

Competition was open to all except track lettermen.

Beaverton thinclads kept up their unblemished record for the season by defeating Newberg and Tigard in a tri-way meet last Thursday.

In the first regular meet of the year, Beavermen placed in every event except the ½ mile, racking up 81 points. Newberg scored 38 and Tigard 7.

Outstanding effort of the day was a 4:40.4-minute mile turned in by Adams of Newberg. By comparison, second-place Murray Bartley was nearly 20 seconds behind Adams.

Beaverton took first in 11 of the 14 events, while Newberg captured the other three. Both Newberg and Beaverton had clean sweeps in one event. The Beavers took 1-2-3 in high hurdles and Newberg duplicated the feat in the 880-yard run.

Hens Average 17 More Eggs Than National Figure

Egg producers in the state are getting more and more eggs from their flocks.

In 1949, says Noel L. Bennion of OSC, the average hen in the state laid 182 eggs—an increase of 33 eggs in 20 years. Meanwhile, the average egg production in Oregon last year was 17 eggs per hen higher than the national average.

A large proportion of this increase production reportedly occurred during the fall and winter months. Increase over the peak producing months of April and May shows only slight changes.

The annual rate of lay, Bennion believes, could be still further increased if poultrymen would replace a higher proportion of their flocks with pullets each year. Pullets lay 25 to 30 percent more eggs during their first year of lay than they will during their second.

Each year thereafter, a corresponding reduction occurs. Thus, it takes pullets to produce eggs during the late summer, fall, and winter months when egg prices are traditionally highest.

 Onward they march by the millions in endless line, And who says they are dead men?

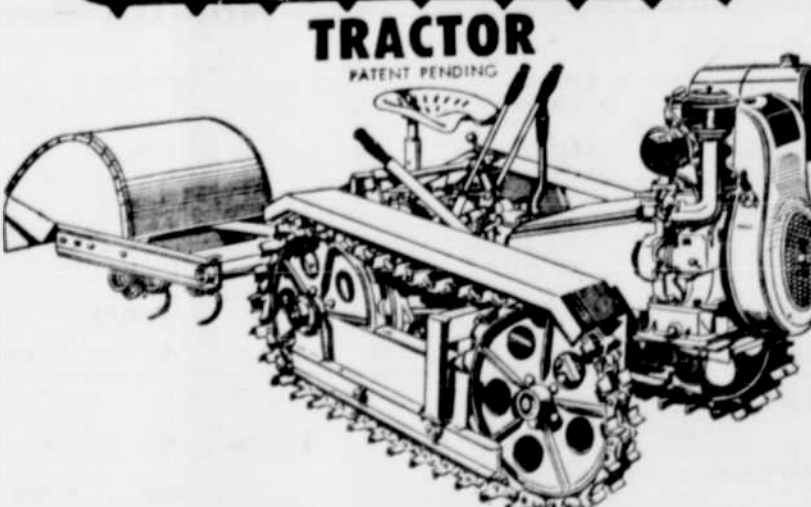
God names them dead. He made them, fed them, grew them and left them free to sin or not as they might choose. They choose
