SPRINGTIME SPORT

Springtime sport breaks into full bloom in Bend, on May 13. The PILOT announces final playoff for the marble playing championship will be held at that date. The Fraternal Order of Eagles is sponsoring the event statewide.

Both girls and boys are eligible to participate and winners will enter the state finals to be held in Portland May 20.

WEATHER STATION SET

St. Helens is about to be set up as the weather center of the area. According to the SENTINEL-MIST, only the finding of a competent volunteer observer to make and transmit daily recordings holds up the establishing of a weather station for the trading area.

Authorization by the department of commerce is regarded as a mere formality since the Portland weather bureau had begun preliminary work some two months ago.

Equipment to be installed include maximum and minimum thermometers, rain gauges and instrument shelters.

AUCTION FOR JAMBOREE

Eight Lebanon boys have their minds on Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, where the national Boy Scout Jamboree will take place in June.

As reported by the EXPRESS, scouts in the city are scouring all sources for items to be auctioned off to raise a good bit of the \$300 apiece required for the trip expenses.

Merchants have come to the front with a number of items to go on sale. These include a radio, swing rocker, occasional chair, trash burner, steam iron, lightweight iron, couple load of plywood cores, coffee maker, baby carriage, oil heater, pressure cooker, gas floor furnace, floor lamps and numerous smaller items.

DOUBLES RED X QUOTA

Prineville makes significant news in its whirlwind Red Cross solicitation drive.

The CENTRAL OREGONIAN relates total receipts were \$1,360.58, almost 100% above the \$723 quota set for Crook county.

By its successful campaign, the county was the first in Oregon to not only meet its obligations but to exceed them so significantly.

A wartime sector and block leader organization, with about 100 solicitors participating, is credited for the accomplishment.

COMMUNITY AMBULANCE

Oakridge dedicated a new ambulance for Mercy's sake!

Says the TELEGRAM, the Red Cross has donated sheets, pillow cases, first aid equipment, splints and a folding portable stretcher.

Before being turned over to community use, the new 1950 Chevrolet sedan delivery was outfitted with additional lights and windows, a siren on the front fender, red and green blinker light on top, a spotlight on the center of the top and a blinker stop light on the rear.

SCHOOL CONSOLIDATION

Hood River taxpayers are giving the matter of high school consolidation, on a county-wide basis, serious consideration following an open forum talk by experts.

In the NEWS, an account tells that the county could establish a central high school any place within its boundaries and still have children traveling less distance than in many existing Oregon school districts.

In the matter of size, the president of the Oregon College of Education points out that the preferred size of a high school student body is between 400 and 1,000. After the higher figure, the advantages of size begins to taper off, he said.

Advantages of larger over small high schools, as established by OCE studies on quality students, are the simpler and less expensive administration; richer curriculum and less overloaded teachers.

EQUAL WATER SUPPLY

Lake County expects a water supply at least equal if not better than of last season.

The COUNTY EXAMINER offers results of a water survey which gives backing to predictions of the valuable fluid commodity.

Mountain watersheds soils under the snow are well wet, due to some mid-winter snow melting. This is called a fortunate circumstance since fall precipitation was insufficient to wet the watershed.

TREE FARM'S OFFER

Word from Vernonia tells that the Crown Zellerbach tree farm offer still holds good.

In the EAGLE, a dispatch advises that free trees are available from the Columbia Tree Farm offices in Riverview.

Three different species are available this year, the fourth year the offer has been made, Port Orford Cedar, Douglas Fir and Noble Fir are packaged into bundles of 25 trees, ready for distribution to the first one to come.

(A number of inquiries have come to this newspaper office in regard to this offer. All of our information is that the tree farm imposes no restrictions other than 25 trees per person.)

WEEDS UNDER LAW

Philomath weeds face the prospect of coming under county law.

The Benton County REVIEW relates that about forty farmers are agitating for the start of a weed control program to cost around \$9,000 the first year, with estimates for four following years to come later.

COUNTY FIRE PLANS

In McMinnville, there is a growing tendency to disregard city limits in an overall campaign against the destructiveness of fire.

By the TELEPHONE REGISTER comes word of a plan to promote a formal written mutual aid agreement between various cities and rural fire districts of Yamhill county.

Each county, city and rural district will be asked to pledge all available equipment and personnel to assist each other in time of fire emergency. A committee was named to work out the specific details of the county-wide organization.

BEARD SPROUT STARTS

Masculine faces are taking on a more rugged look, as beards start sprouting in preparation for the annual Phil Sheridan Days and Rodeo in June.

The SUN announces that definite signs of stubble-brush are beginning to pop through the surface of be-faces, although some who are making a valiant try haven't been rewarded with too much evidence of their whisker-growing ability.

Prizes will be offered to the best beard cultivator and razors are in for a rest for some time.

SCHOOLS NIX DST

Willamina schools will hypothetically cock a snook at daylight saving time.

The TIMES confides that the school board made such a decision last spring, mostly because of students on bus routes, especially of the lower grades.

Notice of School Election in the Rural School District of Washington County, Oregon, Upon Question of Increasing Tax Levy Over Amount Limited by Section 11, Article XI, State Constitution.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in the District Schoolhouse, May 15, 1950, by the Rural School District of Washington County, State of Oregon, in all component school districts of said Rural School District.

The election will be from 5 to 9 P. M. (Daylight Saving Time) and will be held in the schoolhouse in each of said component districts. The purpose of the election is to submit to the legal voters of the rural school district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1950, over the amount limited by Section 11, Article XI of the Constitution.

The reasons for increasing such levy are to provide necessary school funds.

The amount of tax, in excess of the six per cent limitation proposed to be levied by the rural school district of Washington County, Oregon, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1950, is \$758,219.63 as follows:
