PROGRESS CROWDS ON TWO SIDES OF PLANT

Evidences of Beaverton progress crowds the newspaper plant on both sides as H. W. Schweitzer, 809 Hazel avenue, of the S and S Paint company puts up a modern, concrete block building across the street and Mayor H. H. Jeffries starts a 23' by 50' addition to his building, which at present houses the publishing equipment.

D. R. Cluster, Portland builder, is in charge of the \$16,000 paint building, size 50' by 80'. Deep excavation was required for building footings in the low site where building is now taking place. A dirt fill has also been made, bringing the entrance to the new paint factory even to the street level.

Mr. Schweitzer announces that in addition to manufacture and wholesale business, he will conduct a retail establishment in his new building, which should be completed within thirty days.

Art Cummings, Portland builder, is in charge of Jeffries' addition. Cost has been set at \$5,000 and completion date is within 90 days.
