In fact Mrs. Davis expressed a wish for a whole back yard of boys and thinks now that four will fill their acre very nicely.



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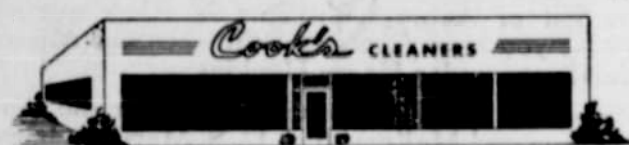
