## Northwest Gardens

THE MAN SAID TO USE IT MORE OFTEN....Did you ever have a come-uptance? Well, we did, on a recent evening during a lecture-discussion before a garden club.

The talk got around to using weed-killers for lawn weeds and, in reply to the question, "When is the best time to put on weed-killers," we had just finished telling the audience that the months of May and September were considered best, and that a good dose of a worthy type of 2,4-D applied once during May and again during September, should definitely eliminate the easy-to-kill types like dandelions and plantains, and would also go a long way toward getting rid of the more resistant weeds like milfoil; the little blue-flowered speedwell; the chickweed; and even that little, sprawling fellow we call the yellow Japanese clover. What do you suppose happened right at that moment?

A young chap arose from his seat, identified himself as a member of the staff of one of our leading Northwest Agricultural Colleges, and proceeded to say something like this, "It's all right to put the weed killers on during May and September. But I disagree with you on the point of how much....you should put on three doses in May, and three doses in September."

All I could do was to admit that perhaps the chap was right but, having the interests of home gardeners at heart, (and out of consideration of their pocketbooks particularly), we feel rather strongly that, if we can just help you get that one, single dose on each May and September, it will have been an accomplishment of no mean proportions.

By all means if you have an infestation of the tough weeds, and have the time and money to do it, put on more than just one application each month (May and September) but be sure you put on at least one dose.

Also out of consideration for the home gardener's purse, we strongly recommend that it is more economical to (1) buy and use a good weed-killer by itself, then (2) purchase one of the better-grade, organic-base fertilizers (one which

you will be using elsewhere in the garden anyway) and put on enough to pep up the grass. You get more for your money that way.

Take it easy with the weed killers on newly-started lawns. Try to eliminate the weeds before seeding, either by cultivation or by the use of a 2,4-D applied once or twice, and at least two or three weeks before sowing the grass. Otherwise, wait until the September period before putting the weed-killer on the young lawn.

IT'S AN OLD AMERICAN CUSTOM....that should be preserved. Even though you may have no children of your own, did you ever think how much pleasure you could bring to the youngsters in the neighborhood if you could just put in a pumpkin or two, giving the big, fat fruits to the kids for "pumpkin" faces at Halloween time?

As an added note of interest, you can carve the young ones' names into the skin of the pumpkin in August and, as it matures the scar will develop to such a degree that they will think their names actually "grew" there. Maybe it's time you tried a "pumpkin" face yourself, just for auld lang syne. The new bush pumpkin doesn't take up much space.

THE FLOWERS THAT BLOOM IN THE SUMMER....among which will be found, right at the head of the parade, the Violas, which are so ideal for many, many spots in the garden....for the rockery, the formal bed, the flower border or for an edging.

Old holdover plants from last year, which will be blooming early, can be cut back severely when they begin to sprawl out too much, and they'll come right back with a late summer or fall crop of real beauty.

ALL PLANTS NEED THOSE MINOR, OR TRACE, ELEMENTS the very same ones which you and I need in our diets if we expect to remain healthy, strong and resistant to diseases. Best and most efficient way to apply them is by means of some of the convenient mixtures which will cost no more than a penny a gallon to prepare. Some of them even contain iodine, for the benefit of those of us who live in the Northwest's goiter belt.

APHIDS BEGIN TO DEVELOP in abundance in May. Lindane compounds have been talked up a lot for control, and they are good. Some gardeners, however, particularly those who incline toward the new organic gardening principles will be using some of the better, safer, rotenone-pyrethrum sprays and dusts. Get the ones with a spreader already mixed in them, and you can do a good job.

Don't forget the Fleece Vine if you are looking for a late-flowering vine to cover some of the larger fence areas, poles or arbors. Can't be beat.

Deutzias of particular merit are Pride of Rochester and the lower-growing gracilis. Another rather low one, Deutzia rosea with purplish flowers, is fine on the west side of the mountains.

Keep your young plants humping right along. The shorter the period of shock or check that they undergo after being set outside, the better and earlier will they flower and fruit. There are some fine booster compounds available which will help a lot.

One for the rockery, and a dandy, is Heuchera or Coral Bells. It is easy to care for, lasts a long time, and comes into bloom late enough (May and June) so as to fill in after the more common types have gone past.

One of the very best of evergreen shrubs is Pieris, sometimes called Andromeda by nurserymen and gardeners. Preferred is the form with drooping clusters of white flowers, japonica, which grows very well indeed when it has a sunshiny spot.

By carrying the deductible policy you pay for the small damage yourself but you make certain you don't have to foot the bill for a really staggering amount.

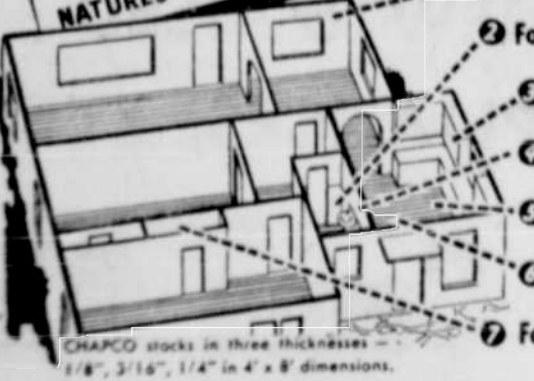
