Co. Judge Seeker Asks Permanent Plan For Roads



Harry M. Seabold, mayor of Hillsboro and candidate for Washington county judge subject to the May 19 primary election, says the top priority responsibility of the county court is to provide a permanent plan for the county road system, even beyond the present burst of enthusiasm for a 3 year levy of \$600,000.

Seabold says a road program must look toward the future, taking into consideration the probable traffic volume that will use the roads now being constructed. Roads must enable a farmer to bring his crops to market without extracting a toll of expense to maintain and repair his car or truck. And citizens who travel from one part of the county to another on either business or pleasure should not be victims of broken springs, tire blowouts or other hazards occasioned by disrepair of roads.

If nominated and elected, Seabold promises, he will call together representative people from all parts of the county to tackle the problem of a permanent road system, taking into consideration the demands of future traffic. Following this, meetings will be held in all parts of the county to acquaint taxpayers of proposals and a vote will be called for to put the plans into effect.

In the matter of juvenile problems, Seabold declares that youth must be served now, as an encouragement of better citizenship when they are grown. He would establish a council of mothers and fathers to work with the county probation officer in all matters touching upon the young.

Under his administration also, any person having a major or minor matter to bring before the county court would receive prompt consideration, courteous attention.

The candidate for county judge was born in Minnesota and has lived for the past 35 years in Washington county. He owns the Washington County Agencies real estate firm, in which his two sons, Harry C. and Jack N., are also active. He is a member of the Hillsboro Grange, Chamber of Commerce, all Masonic bodies, Pythian, IOOF, and Eastern Star lodges.
