Donations Give Alaska Natives Craft Materials

WEST SLOPE — Mrs. Vernon Churchill is one of about 200 persons who will leave in a few days on a tour to Alaska, a project sponsored by a Portland newspaper. The party will spend the remainder of May visiting government schools at Wrangell and Sitka.

Mrs. Churchill is making a change in the usual procedure of sending dolls to the children in the schools. Instead she is gathering materials the youngsters can make into toys and small items of daily living, of their own ingenuity.

Included in the packages are varying lengths of materials, rayons, velvets, and other materials to be fashioned into doll dresses, with trimmings of feathers, flowers, lace and ribbons. Also included are over two pounds of buttons, and patterns for the older girls to sew in cutting out the articles. Scissors, thread and needles, are

also part of the equipment a large part of which has been donated by interested individuals and groups, including the Women's Missionary Society of the Valley Community Church. A large box of Christmas cards to be made into pictures and scrap books goes with the other gifts.

A contrast in modes of travel in the north country was recently offered when the children of the Wrangell school, which was being remodeled, were moved by plane to Sitka to stay until the repair was done.

Seven hours travel on the plane, covered the distance from the two locations, which is comparable to the distance between Portland and San Diego.

Children at the school range in age, mainly, up to and about twelve years, but there are a few of high school age.

The visitors will return June 2.

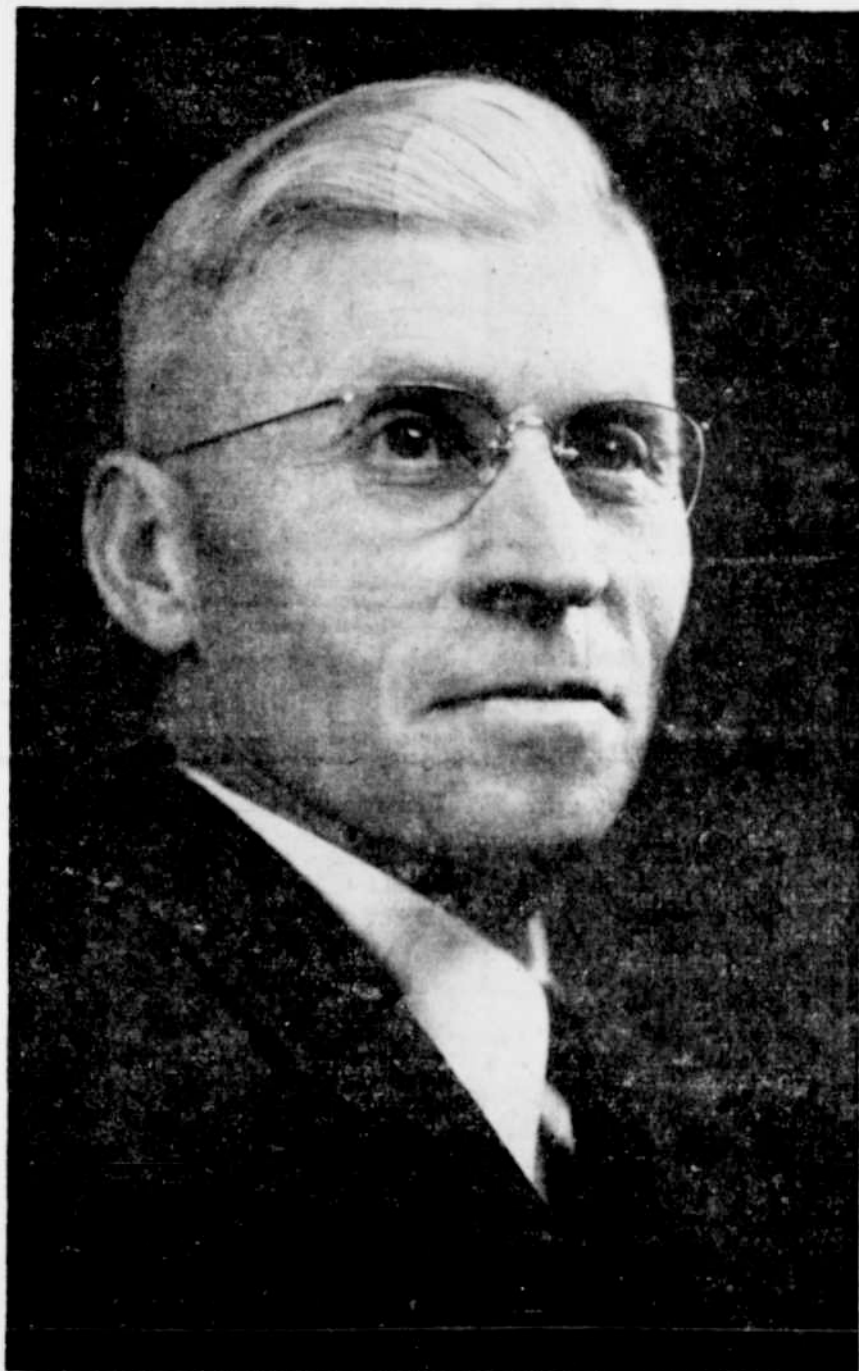
Canyon Baptist Vacation School Opens May 29th
