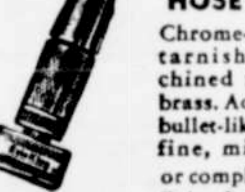

IN NAVY FOR THREE YR.

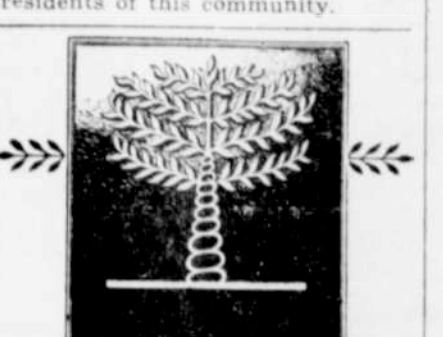
