Announcement of the meeting was made at the company's Janesville, Wisconsin offices by James N. Black, sales vice president.

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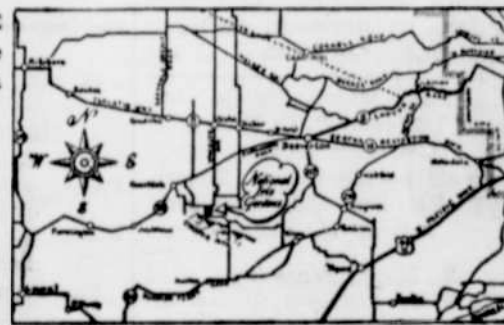
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
