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County Groups Protest Cut In Health and 4-H

Write-In Nominates 2 For State Legislative Contest

DEMOCRATS ESTABLISH CANDIDATE PAIR IN
PRIMARY VOTE; PRECINCT OFFICERS LISTED

Tabulation of write-in votes of the recent primary election returns, just concluded by the office of the county clerk, adds two candidates to the general election race for state representative, on the Democratic ticket, announces W. A. Tupper.

James N. Shick, Forest Grove, and Al Bobbitt, Route 1, Box 218, Aloha, both attorneys, will oppose the Republican candidates J. O. Johnson and Earl Fisher, both incumbents, on the November ticket.

Shick cornered 237 votes while Bobbitt received 212. The two men prosecuted a vigorous campaign in behalf of nomination by write-in and are said to have the backing of the county Democratic organization.

In other write-in results, Harry A. Seabold, successful Republican candidate for county judge, walked off with the Democratic nomination as well, by a vote of 149. Closest challenger was Judge H. D. Kerkman, also Republican, who netted 74 votes.

H. P. Barrows, surveyor, added the Democratic nomination to his Republican designation, by 44 votes, and Maud Boscow, county treasurer renominated without opposition as a Republican, also won the Democratic nod, with 54 votes.

Determined Delegation To Fight Deletion In Budget

PUBLIC MEETING JUNE 26 IN HILLSBORO
COURTHOUSE GOES INTO FISCAL POLICIES

Battle lines are being drawn as groups within the county plan to protest proposed slashes in the county budget which would completely eliminate home demonstration agents for the year and reduce the staff of the public health office.

In accordance with state law, a public meeting will be held Monday, June 26, 10 a. m. in the county courthouse, at which time and place opportunity will be given for full and complete discussions of budgetary estimates and fiscal policies. By all indications, there will be plenty citizens who will take advantage of the invitation.

On June 9, about 25 women leaders of county extension units and 4H girls clubs met with Joe Cox, county extension agent for an all day session in the Hillsboro Episcopal parish hall to map out a presentation of facts, preparatory to challenging the deletion of the home demonstration agent

by reason of a \$3,820 slash in county appropriation.

This cut, aimed at clerical hire, materials and expense, telephone and telegraph, travel and equipment, takes away the necessary funds by which two home demonstration agents function.

Primarily affected by the loss of this extension service will be the county women extension units and the entire county program of girls 4H clubs, both of which depend upon the demonstration agents for leadership.

Important services of public health also will be drastically curtailed by the leaving out of an item of \$3,140 for a third nurse's salary and travel expenses. This, according to the county public health officer, will necessitate a heavier burden on the two nurses who remain.

In both departments hit by the economy move of the county budget committee, the federal and state governments provide significant contributions. Under the planned economy, such money will not be forthcoming.

Expenditures approved for 1950-'51, as compared to 1949-50 are listed:

County court, commissioners' department, increase to \$11,030 from \$14,970; probate and juvenile department, remains the same at \$3,430.

County sheriff, criminal department, cut to \$32,415, from \$33,675; tax department, cut to \$18,055, from \$18,710; county jail, increased to \$5,270 from \$4,745.

County treasurer, increased to \$6,436 from \$6,176.

County attorney, increased to \$2,620 from \$2,400.

County school superintendent, increased to \$12,520 from \$12,050.

County assessor, increased to \$24,765, from \$23,840.

County surveyor, increased to \$12,275 from \$4,350.

Justice courts, increase to \$15,750 from \$15,450.

Circuit court, increase to \$13,200 from \$10,500.

County clerk, increased to \$26,820 from \$25,980.

Public health unit, cut to \$30,320 from \$32,535.

Public assistance, increased to \$177,658 from \$152,383.

County courthouse and grounds, increased to \$12,369 from \$12,169.

County coroner, unchanged at \$350.

County hospital and home, increased to \$37,455 from \$32,955.

Agricultural activities, increased to \$20,330 from \$18,330.

County agent, increased to \$7,464.50 from \$7,280.

Home demonstration agent, cut to \$500 from \$3,820.

Miscellaneous items, increased to \$70,900 from \$69,350.

Total budget for general fund, increased to \$545,481.50 from \$506,273.

Proposed total levies for county general, road and school funds beyond anticipated revenues are set at \$659,095.

An indication of the importance of the school's role in the life of the community is shown in the figures compiled by Errol Hassell, Beaverton school superintendent. A record of the uses to which the school buildings have been put during the past year demonstrate a wide range of interests in Beaverton in both adult and child levels.

Youth organizations have held 190 meetings since last summer. These include such groups as Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls, Cub Scouts, Brownies, Bluebirds and 4H groups.

Forty meetings dealing with recreation have been scheduled in the schools and the PTA has used the buildings 24 times. There have been 25 square dancing sessions and four well baby clinics.

Athletics have played a part in the school facilities also with 42 soft ball and baseball games during the year.

Community organizations including the American Legion, Business and Professional Women's Club, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Izaak Walton League and the Junior Chamber of Commerce together with dance and music recitals have accounted for 40 extra-curricular meetings at the schools.
