Dear Mary Grace: Our family is fond of Chinese dishes—but since moving to the country I find that restaurants serving such dishes are scarce. Could you give me a recipe for some Chinese dish that is simple and not starchy—as I cannot eat starches of any kind. Thank you, S. P.

Dear S. P.: Thanks to our modern grocery stores featuring the latest in canned and frozen foods, no homemaker need feel 'out of things' no matter where she lives. With a little time and a willingness to make a meal more than just something to eat, the housewife can make dinner a happy time for family gathering. Here is a recipe that is simple to prepare and tasty too. There isn't a bit of starch in it—although your family may like rice served with it. **CHINESE SHRIMP:**

- Ingredients for 4:**
- 1 can bean sprouts or frozen, (optional)
  - 1 can shrimp (7 oz.)
  - 1 large onion chopped
  - 1/2 cup celery chopped
  - 2 green peppers cut in thin strips
  - 4 tbsp. butter or margarine
  - 1 cup tomatoes (canned or fresh)
  - 6 eggs
  - 1 1/2 tsp. salt—pinch pepper
- Method:**
- Drain shrimp. Saute onion, pepper and celery in half the fat over low heat 3 minutes, add tomatoes cut, simmer. In a large skillet melt rest of fat, add shrimp heat 1 minute. Add beaten eggs, part of salt, cover, cook over low heat 10 minutes (until firm.) To the sauce add bean sprouts if desired, rest of salt, simmer until ready to use. When omelet is set, fold over, place on dish, cover with the sauce and serve at once.
