

LOCAL EMPLOYMENT SERVICE

It's anything about jobs, your local employment office knows about it. And since a person's main interest from 18 to 80 is work of some sort or another, it's only natural that the local office is rapidly becoming the community center for all activities having to do with bread-winning.

As a living directory of training agencies, the local office directs

the youth just out of high school or fresh from the farm to a vocational school, apprentice shop or business college. Counseling is especially important at this age, and a change in occupation can be guided most effectively by reason of this knowledge of training agencies—along with the detailed data concerning industrial or trade development of the area that will bring later employment. On-the-job training fits in with this program.

Or it may be a civil service career that appeals to the person just starting out—or who hasn't yet found his or her niche in the economic world. If so, the local office can put its finger on the appropriate federal, state or local branch of government offering appropriate opportunities. And here again more training or experience may be indicated.

During summer-time or vacation periods the employment office often is the busiest place in town. Issuance of work permits to minors, social security cards, seasonal work—all these and many other matters either can be handled by employment deputies, or they can direct the inquirer to the correct agency.
