

PRIVATE SUNDAY SCHOOL FOR FAMILY GROWS TO GOOD SIZE

WEST SLOPE—Children in the neighborhood of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Cook of 7325 S. W. Canyon Lane, unable for various reasons to attend their own churches, have received religious instruction in Sunday School classes at the Cook home, because the Cooks established a Sunday School for their own children about two years ago.

When the husband and wife graduated from the Moody Bible Institute they planned to go into religious work, but circumstances, including a rapidly growing family, interfered. Early in 1948 they were concerned with the need of a Sunday School for their brood of six children.

Also in the family group were Lynn and Glee Washburn, children of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Washburn, who were missionaries in Colombia South America, and who have recently returned to take the children home after three and one half years residence with Mr. and Mrs. Cook.

With a family of ten as the beginning, the idea of Sunday School at home was formed, and interested children of the neighborhood

were invited to attend. From the nucleus of ten has grown a roll of fifty members with four classes, including Cradle Roll and Primary Groups, Junior Teenagers and Adults.

Average attendance is thirty to thirty-five, and many denominations are represented, the Sunday School being entirely non-denominational.

Most of the attendance is at Sunday School classes, though morning worship is held following the classes each Sunday morning. Prayer meeting is also held on Tuesday evenings.
