Chet was associated with his father in management of Richey's Hardware, before its purchase by Mr. and Mrs. Harry J. Wright.

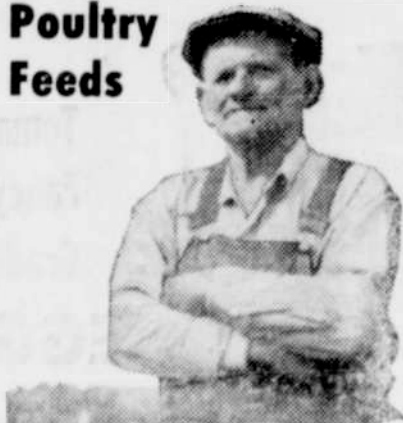
Active in junior chamber of commerce projects, Chet also served on the Beaverton planning commission.

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## Noted In File Of County Sheriff

### CASE OF MISSING VASE

Sometime in the dark of night, after 11 p. m., June 13, an ambitious culprit put the grab on a cement vase at L'Abbe Florists, 6802 S. W. Canyon road. There are baffling overtones.

Melba L'Abbe Caldwell reports the vase was about 3 feet high, almost 18 inches wide weighing in the neighborhood of 75 pounds, set in front of the shop.

A matching vase on the other side of the door was not disturbed. No suspects are listed.

### SUSPICIOUS MAN IN DARK GREEN AUTO

A large man, about 28 or 29, dark and very dirty, is reported in the neighborhood of the St. Mary's Academy, Beaverton.

A 27 year old woman was standing in front of her home, waiting for a bus on June 8. The suspicious character, driving past in an old model dark green or blue car, turned around and came back, parking between the girl and her home. He opened the door and beckoned her toward him. Thereupon, he committed an indecent exposure.

The girl reports she was so scared she couldn't move and the man started his car and went past the girl's academy onto Highway 6 (Tualatin highway).

Vehicle has no muffler or else is distinguished by a loud exhaust. As it shines in the light, it has either a new paint or wax job.

The incident has been reported to the state police and the county sheriff.

### PRIVATE BANK ROBBERY

No burglar alarm went off and no insurance adjusters rushed to the scene to verify the loss and put the FBI on the trail. But Fred Shearer, 7022 S. W. Canyon Lane, is somewhat the poorer by having his accumulated savings evaporate in a private bank robbery committed June 10 between 9 p. m. and 1 a. m.

Shearer and his wife were away from home for 3 or 4 hours and had left several lights burning. When they returned, they discovered a window screen ripped off an unlocked kitchen window. Between \$15 an \$20 in nickels and \$4 or \$5 in pennies was the major loss discovered.

It is believed the Shearers, in returning had scared away the thieves as the house had not been completely and thoroughly ransacked.

### DRIVER BLACKS OUT

Arthur James Dolash, Route 2, Box 194, Beaverton, was taken to the Willamette hospital, Newberg, by the Tualatin First Aid car June 9, after driving his 1949 Mercury sedan into the rear of a Servat Transportation company, Portland, truck operated by Earl Basebinder, of Portland.

The truck driver states he was traveling about 30 mph when the car ran into him. Dolash declared he couldn't remember any circumstances of the crash.

The accident happened two miles south of Six Corners, on Highway 99W.
