Dear Mary Grace: My family likes vegetables best if served with sauces or creamed—is this a proper way of eating them? Do they lose any of their vitamins this way? K.

Dear K: If you have discovered a way of serving vegetables that will make your family eat more of them—by all means do so. Vegetables do not lose any of their properties when creamed or served with sauces—they suffer only when cooked too long. For instance, spinach will cook covered, in ½ inch of water—7 minutes. Cauliflower, broken, cooks in less than 20 minutes, 2 inches of water, uncovered. Many people cook vegetables in too much water for too long a time thus destroying flavor as well as food value. This recipe for string beans can apply to asparagus, cauliflower or broccoli as well. GOLDEN-CREAM BEANS:

Ingredients for 6:

1½ pound whole beans
1½ tsp. butter
½ tsp. salt—pinch pepper
3 hard-boiled eggs
¼ cup rich milk
2 tbs. flour
¼ cup mayonnaise

Method:

Cook beans in boiling salted water until tender—to 25 minutes. Save ½ cup of the liquid. Melt butter, blend in flour, salt, pepper. Add bean stock, cook until thick, stir constantly. Add milk and chopped egg whites. Remove from heat, add mayonnaise. Drain beans, cover with the sauce, sprinkle with the egg yolks pressed through a sieve. This sauce may be flavored with grated cheese (½ cup) or Worcestershire sauce (¼ tsp.)

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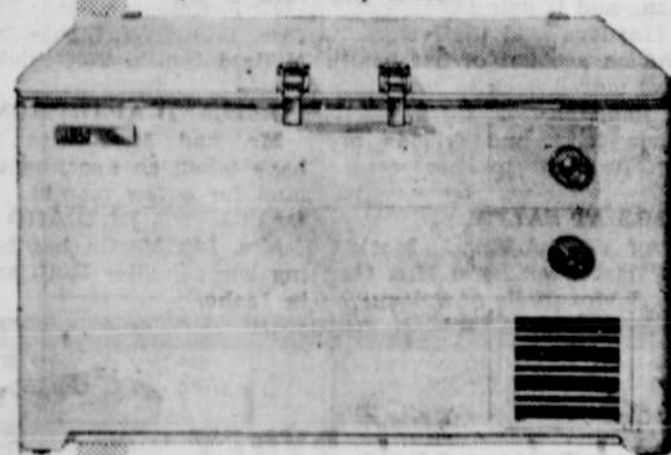
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Gramling-Bess Wedding Pledge Told In Church
