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Double Opening Event For New Businesses This Week

S AND S PAINT FACTORY AND WASHCO FEED AND SUPPLY FEATURE NEW ESTABLISHMENTS

A double grand opening, with all the customary trimmings will highlight the entrance of two new Canyon Road businesses into the area business stream, Friday and Saturday, July 7 and 8.

Located side by side across from the corner of Short street and Tualatin highway, the new firms are the S. and S. Paint Factory and Retail and the Washco Feed and Supply company.

Henry P. Schweitzer, 809 S. W. Hazel, is owner and operator of the paint factory and his wife will be in charge of retail sales, a new venture for the company. Mrs. Schweitzer, previously, had considerable experience in retailing paint.

Schweitzer will undertake the manufacture of all paints, of oil, varnish and synthetic bases. Capacity of his plant will be about 5,000 gallons per month and can be readily increased if necessary.

He has been in the paint making field a number of years. Eighteen years ago, he bought out William E. McGee to establish his own business.

His new building, at the end of Short street, is 50 by 80 feet with floor space of about 6,000 feet due to different levels for more advantageous manufacturing. The building is of concrete block construction and interiors of the second floor office and first floor retail store are of knotty pine.

In the retail store every kind of paint as well as custom service for patrons with particular problems or needs will be available. The factory, for instance, is experimenting with a rubber emulsion paint and will be prepared to market this, primarily for washable walls. A number of specialty paint items will be featured.

Residents of the area are invited to visit the plant either Friday or Saturday. Wesco Water Paint company will offer a demonstration both days. On Saturday, the first 100 ladies will be awarded orchids.

Next door to the paint factory, Martin Ward and Robert Martin, will welcome residents of the area to their new, two-level Washco Feed and Supply company. Both men are experienced in the line, Ward being with Francis Brothers in Portland for 14 years and Martin associated with the same firm for about 5 years.

Ward lives in the Multnomah area, is a well-known member there of the Southwest Hills Kiwanis club, is married and has two daughters, Martin, who just graduated from Lewis and Clark college, has a son and daughter. Both plan eventually to move into the Beaverton area.

Week Tour of N. W. Dairies Includes Co.

SPONSORED PARTY LEAVES PORTLAND BY CHARTERED BUS

The Arbor Rose Brown Swiss dairy farm, on Wheeler avenue at Walker road, and Lindow Brothers Holstein dairy between Bthany and Bonny Slope, will be included July 19 in a seven-day Oregon-Washington tour sponsored by the Western Dairy Journal of Los Angeles, California, which leaves Portland July 17 for a visit to leading purebred Holstein, Guernsey, Jersey and Brown Swiss herds.

Travel will be by chartered bus and private car and an extensive itinerary is planned. Return to Portland is scheduled on Sunday, July 23.

This is the first such dairy tour of Oregon and Washington under the auspices of the Journal. Included in its members will be dairy men of the Northwest and out-of-state visitors who are interested in dairying and management practices, as well as in buying cattle or farms.

Some will be agricultural college students, some will represent equipment or other mechanical industrial firms; most will be dairy farmers out to learn more about their work, according to Nelson R. Crow, publisher of the Journal.

"It is our hope," he adds, "that all will acquire a liberal education during the 7-day trip."

Included in practices to be viewed by and demonstrated for the dairy tourists are matters of herd management, feeding, growing feed, putting up grass silage, sprinkler irrigation and irrigated pasture mixes and the parading of champion show animals and producers.

Stops will be made at the Oregon State college and the Astoria experiment stations, where disease control and marketing problems will be discussed.

Herds to be seen during the tour range from one world's record herd with only 12 cows to some of the largest commercial herds in the Pacific Northwest.

Anyone interested in dairying is invited to join the tour for one day or the entire week. Information as to itinerary may be obtained from the Washington county extension agent's office.

Hiway Com. Asks Bid on Broadway St.

RESURFACING AND WIDENING PROJECT TACKLED JULY 11TH

Bids on the widening and resurfacing of the Beaverton Hillsdale secondary highway, on Broadway street in Beaverton, will be accepted July 11 by the Oregon state highway commission, in its Portland meeting.

The commission meets July 10 and 11, at such time calling for bids on 32 projects in 22 counties at an estimated total expenditure of \$2,200,000. Included are two bridges, three buildings, two rock production jobs and 25 road construction projects.

Road work involves 32 miles of grading; 43.57 miles of rock base or surfacing; 87 miles of oiling work and 24.27 miles of asphaltic concrete paving.

The Beaverton job plans are to widen and resurface existing pavement between Cedar and Short streets to provide a 26 foot asphaltic paved street section with new curbs on the north side.

Preparatory to this improvement by the state, the city has replaced wooden water mains and has further projected a complete "face-lifting" of Broadway eastward to the railroad tracks at East street.

Presbyterians In Annual Session Okay Korea Act

LEWIS AND CLARK COLLEGE, Portland, Ore., June 30—Approximately 125 ministers and elders of the Presbyterian churches in the state gathered for the three-day Presbyterian Synod of Oregon closed its sixtieth annual session here at Lewis and Clark College Thursday with a unanimously voted commendation for the U. S. government's action "through United Nations channels in confronting the Korean situation."

The churchmen expressed hope that it will become more evident "to the underprivileged peoples of the world that the Christian faith offers a profoundly greater hope for justice and brotherhood than Marxian communism can possibly offer."

City Votes on Annexation Of Area Next To Pinehurst

ELECTION ON JULY 7 ALSO INCLUDES BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR AND MANAGER EMPLOYMENT

Annexation of 18.5 acres adjacent to the Pinehurst area, part of a 40 acre tract upon which the Beaverton Highlands company is erecting a 50-unit housing development, will be voted on July 7, along with the city budget and employment of a city manager, announces Mayor H. H. Jeffries.

According to A. M. Baker, superintendent of the project who recently moved to Beaverton, the new development will be called the Sandberg addition and is in conjunction with original housing plans of the Kaiser Community homes of California.

Four models are being built at present, of two and three room type with oil furnace heat and fireplaces. The finished project will include streets, sewer, water, sidewalks and street lights with lots of at least 65 foot frontage and 100 feet or more in depth.

Local labor is being used on the construction. Electrical contract has been awarded the Beaverton Service company and some local carpentering is also included.

Ormand Bean, jr., of Portland, is responsible for the architectural designs.

Ed Sandberg, of Portland, is builder of the homes, being commissioned by Kaiser Community Homes to undertake the construction in line with local trends and demands.

The group is across from the Canyon Drive-In theatre, about 300 yards toward Pinehurst. Entrance will be on Bertha-Beaverton highway and expected selling price range will be from \$8,500 to \$10,750.

Election polls, at the city hall, will be open from 8 a. m. to 3 p. m., standard time, or from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m., daylight saving time.

Budget to be voted, over the 6 per cent limitation, totals \$28,500, of which some \$5,000 will be allocated to the possible hiring of a city manager.
