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State Designates Club Library As Official Branch

Designated by the state library as an official branch, the new community public library, established and sponsored by The Century club for women, opened formally Tuesday, in the lower level of the West Slope bank building. More than 1000 books of its own already are on the library shelves plus a loan collection from the state library.

At the outset library hours will be from 1:30 p. m. to 4:30 p. m. Tuesday and Thursdays with members of the Century Club acting as volunteer librarians. It is planned to extend the hours, as the public need for it is manifest.

"Community response to the establishment of a free public library has been most gratifying," says Mrs. Vernon R. Churchill, president of the Century club.

Books have come from many sources which have no active connection with the Century Club but whose donors realize the need for a public library and want to help this one along.

Lumber and hardware companies along Canyon Road have provided lumber from which husbands of club members are building book shelves.

Other friends have contributed furniture, rugs, draperies and lamps. Scores of Century club members have helped in the stamping of the books, pasting in the card envelopes and now are at work on the cataloging under the direction of professional librarians, who are also donating their time and service.

Simple rules, copies of which may be obtained at the library, will govern the loaning of the books and the issuing of the library cards. The collection already at hand, has many attractive children's books and much good fiction.

Many more books of all kinds are asked. They may be left at the library during library hours. If an intending donor is unable to do that, then a telephone call to Mrs. Gerald Tucker, AT 0304, will result in arrangements being made to pick-up the books.
