Secretary Visits Much of Country On 3 Week Trip

The party visited Salt Lake City first and swam in the famous Salt Lake. They also visited the copper mines, the salt beds and the Mormon Tabernacle.

Outside Cheyenne, Wyoming, they were met by a cowboy who welcomed them to the city and suggested points of interest for them to visit. Also in Wyoming they saw the "Thousand Springs", believed formed from an underground river and startling to tourists in the midst of the desert. Another Wyoming point of interest was a typical "Old West" town containing the first Wyoming school house at Fort Bridges.

In Chicago the group spent a day at the Hall of Science which boasts a complete mine set up with real coal miners to escort visitors. Other scenes which impressed the travelers were the Rushmore Memorial, the Black Hills where they saw a herd of buffalo; a tribe of Indians dancing in full regalia at North Platte, Nebraska; the bad lands of S. Dakota and a huge dam on the Mississippi River.
