

MISSIONARY FLEES FURY OF KOREA WAR ON HOUR'S NOTICE

WEST SLOPE — Doctor Ralph Pearson, former Multnomah physician and later adventist missionary in Korea, about whose safety Oregon friends and relatives, including Mrs. Fred Mathis and Mrs. Harold Webb of West Slope have been concerned spoke over the radio from San Francisco Saturday evening. He reached there earlier in the week after fleeing from Seoul with his family on less than an hour's notice.

Details of the escape have not yet been learned, but Doctor Pearson stated in his radio talk that the Missionary hospital of which he was Staff Physician was taken over by the North Koreans in a matter of minutes after the family fled with only one suit case of personal belongings. All the rest of their possessions were left behind.

The family have been attending the 7th Day Adventist conference in San Francisco and are expected to return to Oregon in the near future.

The Oregon and Washington troups were camped on General Poor's Brigade ground and one mile from General Washington's Headquarters and one block from the Washington Memorial.

The outstanding event of the Jamboree was affirmed by most of the boys to be the July 4th speech by General Eisenhower, which the boys rated as inspirational and thought-provoking.

The return trip started July 9 and high light of the trip were a New York tour where some of the boys appeared on television, Niagara Falls and the Ford Motor plant.

At this place the boys were served box lunches, each containing miniature Ford cars complete with motor, which caused the train porters much later concern when the boys staged races in the train aisles.

Warner Bros. Studio in Hollywood, Alcatraz prison, San Francisco's China Town, were also visited. Jon agreed with the other members of his troupe that the Slogan "Keep Oregon Green" was more than fitting after viewing the many miles of desert land and tree less plains along their tour and the tumbling rivers and towering mountains of their home country were cooling and refreshing to the home coming lads.
