#### "JAZZ ONLY PROVES A KIND OF OPIATE"

Editor "Beaverton Enterprise":  
 May I express a few heretical opinions on America's most "sacred music", namely JAZZ in order to see if some sense might be made in the consideration thereof? To be sure, the popular taste recoils at anybody even attempting to take exception to this kind of noise being passed off for music, but tell me when has popular taste been for the best?  
 Jazz, as I recall, began with the first world war, around 1918. Since then it has been hiccoughing its blatant syncopation with ever increasing tempo threatening to choke out the last vestige of real and good music which a corrupted popular taste can no longer endure or appreciate.  
 A further consideration of jazz might lead one to conclude that it belongs to about the same class of things as do gluttony, drunkenness, and sensuality in general. In fact, much of modern jazz is only a kind of libidinous stimulation.  
 Many find it a kind of opiate to an accusing conscience from which they want to get away from. Like alcohol, it is a false redeemer. Instead of escape or happiness, it brings only bitterness afterwards.  
 The point of the whole matter seems to be that man cannot go against his essential or true nature without suffering and obviously jazz is an abnormal and unhealthy thing that simply cannot fit into his normal nature.  
 But man is a sinner—that is, he lives and acts against his true welfare even while he knows it and doesn't like it. He defies his own ideal possibilities and jazz is just that.  
 Here we moderns are: anxious, worried, frustrated, . . . facing the abyss of futility and meaninglessness for which jazz is offered as a palliative only to worsen the whole matter by adding discord to inner tumult.  
 America needs desperately something to produce inner serenity, coherence, and meaning to life and that is the function of good music. Newspaper editors, magazine articles, preachers, educators, etc., ought to join a crusade on behalf of good music, the kind that will make existence more truly happy.  
 Discord, noise, i.e., jazz runs counter to this.
