HOARDING ACTIVITIES

In Gresham, at the outbreak of Korean warfare, a spurge of buying—obviously denoting the urge to hoard—came to attention.

The OUTLOOK cited a sudden upswing in demand for automobiles, tires, appliances and some lines of groceries.

One merchant pointed out that most of the people who made a mad dash to buy new refrigerators, stoves, washers and automobiles had been planning on buying but the war scare merely galvanized them into action.

Sugar, in great seasonal demand at the present time saw a tremendous turnover even in excess of the heavy expectations. While hoarders have succeeded in nudging prices upward, some grocers predict a later falling price.

Builders have started to scurry for lumber, a search which is further aggravated by a recent mild fire. Plumbers, too, suspect a gray market is beginning to operate in the pipe supply, with shortages noted and one price raise already on. Speculators, it is supposed, are buying up huge pipe supplies and holding them from the market for eventual higher prices.

QUESTION OF BASEBALL

Fans of St. Helens turned out recently 400 strong to see the Lucky Beavers take a mild trouncing, an event sponsored by the local chamber of commerce.

The CHRONICLE poses an interesting question in this regard. How, it asks, could such a crowd be inveigled into attending a local

ball game, other than move it to Vaughn St.?

The editor points out that the town has three hard ball teams of kids who play a good brand of ball.

TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENT

Moreland and East Moreland have a problem of some height and magnitude and they are determined to do something about it.

Seems, says the SELLWOOD-MORELAND BEE, that the Bybee avenue-McLoughlin boulevard intersection has become generally recognized as one of the most dangerous intersections in the city.

Progress-urgers of the two neighborhoods undertook a two-months study of the area and have come up with a recommendation that a cloverleaf should be installed to effectively control the lurking death-hazards.

However, aware of the probable cost of such a solution, the group indicates it will be satisfied if traffic lights might be installed, for the time being.

Yet, even in this matter, the question of cost looms inasmuch as the city must pay half the cost on any traffic lights or other changes. This improvement has not been noted in any recommendations of the budget to date.

REALLY RAISING 'L'

An incident of some notice in Lakeview is the 'L' the local Lions club has been raising in one of its recent projects.

The LAKE COUNTY EXAMINER relates that a work party of about 15 members took off on a recent Saturday to clear away brush that had overgrown the huge letter 'L' which stands as a beacon behind the town. Next will come a generous coat of whitewash of rocks that form the outline and the body of the letter.

High school students maintained the letter for a number of years, before enthusiasm died out. No renovation has taken place in the past several years.

The letter is about 20 feet thick, 100 feet high and 60 feet wide, according to specifications reported.

JAIL HOUSING NEEDS

In Willamina was emphasized that not only dispossessed tenants but those caught in the steely embrace of John Law remark housing needs.

The TIMES highlights this situation in report of a talk before the local Kiwanis of the county sheriff. Over crowded conditions at the county jail, it was declared by the speaker, show the need of facilities at once.
