EX-PASTOR REMEMBERED

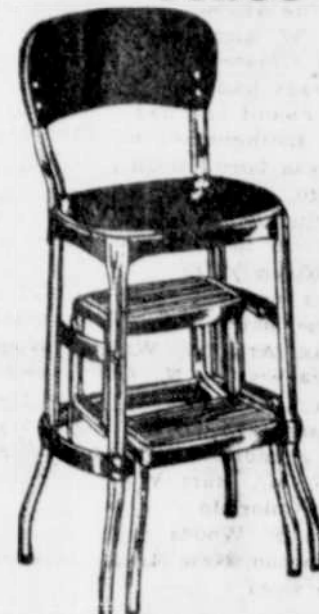
Mrs. J. J. Patton and son, Beach, of Hood River, Oregon, were Sunday visitors at Beaverton Methodist Church.

His son, Beach, is a teacher at Hood River.

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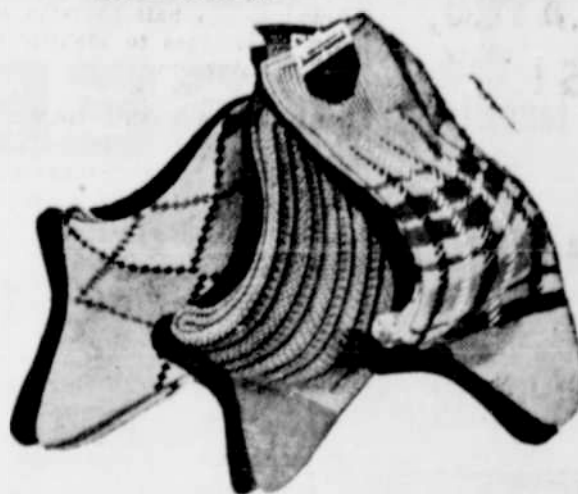
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
