Gov't. Tightens Up On Supports For Veteran Housing

The veterans administration has
made a number of changes in G.I.
home loan regulations in compli-
ance with the president's decision
to tighten up on housing credit
supports and to conserve available
material and labor, it has been
announced by the VA.

Effective immediately, the fol-
lowing restrictions have been placed
in effect by the VA:

(1) No loans needing prior ap-
proval by the VA will be okayed
unless the veteran makes a cash
down payment equal to at least 5
percent of the purchase price or
construction cost. This will affect
all loans made by mortgage com-
panies, and some loans made by
banks and savings and loan associa-
tions.

(2) In the case of automatic
loans no certificate of guaranty
will be issued unless the veteran
has paid all closing costs in cash.
Automatic loans may be made by
supervised lenders, a category in-
cluding savings and loan associa-
tions, banks and insurance com-
panies who have the privilege of
granting loans to veterans without
advance approval of the VA. The
5 percent down payment will not
be required by the VA for these
automatic loans.

(3) In the estimation of repro-
duction costs as an element in
determining reasonable value no
recognition will be given to costs
higher than those prevailing on
July 1, 1950.

The above restrictions also will
apply equally to direct loans made
by the VA. They will not affect
new dwelling units on which con-
struction was begun prior to July
19, 1950, or to any case in which
a certificate of reasonable value
is outstanding or a request for
appraisal received before July 1,
1950.

Jobless Numbers Drop To Lowest Mark In 5 Years

Renewed harvest demands and a
general business and industrial ex-
pansion during the past month cut
the number of active job-seekers
to 21,000—lowest August 1 figure
in five years—the Oregon State
Employment Service announced to-
day. With one exception, October 1,
1948, it was the lowest monthly
estimate since the end of World
War II.

A year ago 40,000 persons were
out of work and on August 1, 1948,
the count was 23,400. Only a month
ago local offices reported 29,400
unemployed, while the peak last
February was 94,000.

Construction, lumber and logging,
trade, and food processing account-
ed for most of the recent pick-up,
but employment in fruit and veg-
etable canneries continues to lag
behind recent seasons.

The metropolitan area showed
the biggest decrease—4,000—in un-
employment last month, but more
timber and farm jobs dropped
Eugene from 4,700 to 1,675. A labor
dispute settlement at Klamath
Falls put 1,100 back to work, while
bigger salmon and tuna deliveries
at Astoria resulted in a decline
to 380 unemployed, lowest in sev-
eral years. With the exception of
Lebanon, Oregon City, Pendleton
and Freewater, most areas report-
ed fewer persons looking for jobs.

Increasing demands for bean
pickers through the Willamette
Valley and other prospective har-
vests are expected to make further
inroads on the unemployed dur-
ing the next few weeks. Salem,
Albany, Eugene and McMinnville
ask for 2,500 additional bean field
workers next week, while Hills-
boro, Lebanon, and Portland ex-
pect increased demands soon.

Medford will need several hundred
pear pickers about August 14, and
a little later many jobs will be
provided by hops in the Salem and
Grants Pass areas.

Unfilled job openings also picked
up markedly, mainly because of the
demand for skilled and semi-skilled
help. More than 2,000 non-farm
jobs found no available workers as
compared with 1,467 a month ago
and 987 a year ago.
