Vineyard sets no restrictions on use of his pool. At all hours they come, he says, and the whole project is worth what it will eventually cost by the satisfaction kids get in using it.

Water to fill the pool is from the lines of the Aloha-Huber water district, without any appeal for special rate.

District 48 Doubts City Title To Lot

SITE SOUGHT FOR
CREAMERY CAUSES
BIG CONTROVERSY

In a communication to the Beaverton city council, read at the meeting of August 14, school district 48 casts doubts on the city's title to a lot bordering the Southern Pacific railroad, across from the Merle Davies school, which is being sought as a site for a future creamery.

The school district declares, however, that if the city has clear title to the land it would be interested in negotiating for the purchase. The council replies with the statement that interest in the purchase might best be expressed by payment of \$500 earnest money and the city would thereafter be obliged to institute a title search and verify the deed it has in hand.

Attorneys from the Southern Pacific railway have also entered the dispute, although the mayor declares they are seemingly able to shed very little light on the situation.

Suggestion by Clarence Wilson to solve the problem of extending sewer service to the Manning building, Kiwanis hall, post office and other buildings adjacent to the alley between Angel and Watson is still being pursued by the council.

Wilson points out that a new line might be installed at the abutting property line of the block between Farmington road and First street. Walt Unis, property owner, has replied to first overtures with a flat "no" unless the line is installed deeply enough to permit a future basement by a future builder.

Sewer engineers indicate the ditch would be at a maximum of 5 1/2 feet. The city points out it always has the power to condemn the property needed, although it prefers to cooperate in the matter.

Installation would effect great savings in sewer lines from the buildings, making long and expensive installation to Farmington road unnecessary by the handler location at the rear of the buildings involved.

Request for a light at 8th and Main street, to overcome darkness cast by a clump of trees, was approved as was street light in front of the Showboat Tavern.

M. K. Bletzinger, resident on Erickson street who does not use city water, protested a \$3 monthly charge for sewer use. He was advised that the charge had been set by ordinance.

Mrs. William Stratton was appointed to the library board to succeed Reverend Leonard Johnson, who has moved from Beaverton.

Dusting oil will be spread on Washington street, from 7th to 9th; on Main, from 2nd to Allen; on Lombard, (shoulder only) from Farmington to Allen; and on 9th, from Main to Watson. These are heavily travelled roads that are heavy with dust.

Backstop for the park ball diamond, at 7th and Watson, will soon be installed, according to another action.

A brass plaque, listing the city officials and engineers of the sanitary sewer system installation, will be installed on the sewage treatment plant.

Oscar Martin and Fred Goyt will look over Broadway, from Lombard east to the ditch, acting on request of the Show Boat Tavern, which wants to blackout in front of its establishment as soon as it is determined where the edge of the road really is.

Mayor Jeffries, pointing out the nature of holding office in the city, read the law regarding elected officials which prohibits them from taking any remuneration in connection with city work. Penalty is one year in jail and/or \$5,000 fine.

State Offers Street Funds Special Deal

HIWAY DEPT. SETS
\$250,000 ASIDE IN
CITIES 'ACCOUNT

Beaverton is in line for special assistance in street repair from a \$250,000 account set aside by the state highway department, under Oregon law, for cities under 5,000 in population, announces H. H. Jeffries, mayor.

Since most cities in the past have waited until January or February, in adverse road-building weather, to make application for some of these funds, the state department has asked for a list of designated projects to meet an October 1, 1950 deadline, for the program of 1951.

Terms of the offer stipulate that streets must not be part of the state network of highways. They must need repair because of an unusual industrial traffic or use by an increased population.

No more than \$15,000 will be allocated in any one year for any city.

Tentative streets upon which repair might be sought, Jeffries adds, include Lombard, Hall and Main streets. Full details and final decision will be released later.
