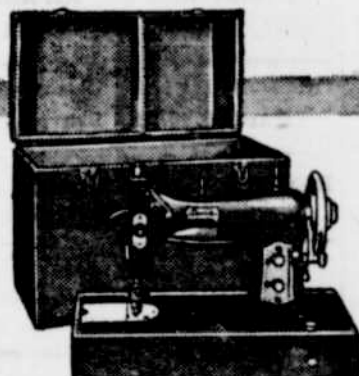

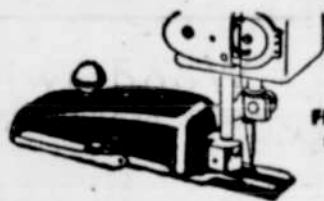

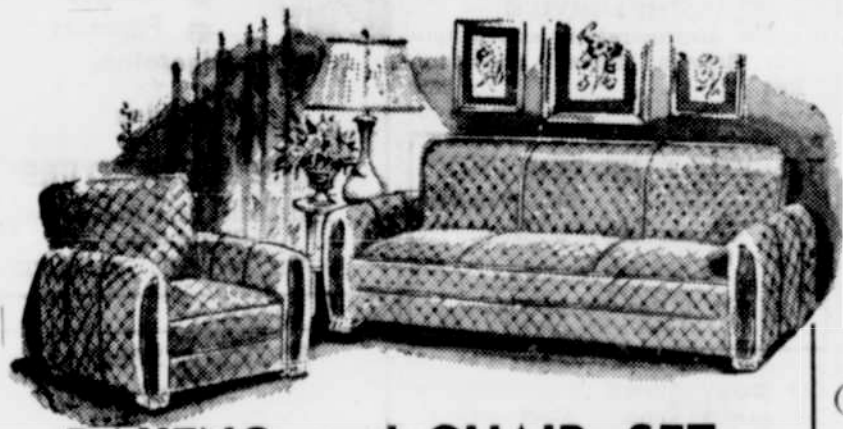

Beaverton High Hands Out Grid Suits And Equipment

IMPORTANT PRE-SEASON FOOTBALL MEET SET
FOR ALL CANDIDATES ON AUGUST 23, 7:30 P. M.

Signalling the beginning of the 1950 football season, Beaverton high school starts handing out uniforms and equipment to grid hopefuls on August 22 and 23, from 1 to 5 p. m., announces Gene Freese, football coach. An important meeting of all team candidates will be held in the dressing rooms on Wednesday, August 23, 7:30 p. m.

A new member of the coaching staff starts this year, in the person of Duane Moore, a 1930 graduate of Oregon State college, who

was a backfield alternate to Dick Twenge. He is considered well versed in his football specialty and will share the coaching burdens of Freese.

Indications of the season ahead point to a note of urgency for the prep gridders to get in shape as fast as possible. A rough schedule looms which amply tests the playing skill of the Beaverton eleven.

Opening game is set for September 15, at Silverton. There will be five home games, to be listed later.
