TWELVE 4H DEMONSTRATION TEAMS COMPETE AT CO. FAIR

Twelve 4-H agricultural demonstration teams will compete in the demonstration contest Saturday, September 2 at the Washington County Fair for a chance to represent the county in four demonstration contests at the Oregon State Fair.

The teams composed of two 4-H members from the same club will demonstrate by words and action some phase of their 4-H club project work. This is one of the most difficult contests in 4-H club work combining speaking ability, subject matter knowledge, and demonstrating skill.

In addition to a trip to the state fair the winning team over all divisions will be awarded the Tualatin Clubs Trophy for highest scoring agricultural demonstration team.

Classes of demonstrations are as follows: Dairy, livestock, crops, and Miscellaneous.

Club Show This Year Promises Record Entries

Despite cramped quarters it appears that this year's 4-H club show will be the largest in history in Washington County according to Co. Ext. Agent Joe Cox.

Livestock entries from all indications will surpass last year's record numbers and crops and other exhibits will increase in proportion.

The dairy showmanship contest will be the first livestock event to get under way starting at 9:00 a. m. Wednesday, August 30. Judge for this event will be B. L. Jacobs, Sixes, Oregon, herdsman for a prominent Jersey herd and former herdsman at Oregon State College. Dairy classes will be judged on Friday by Jacobs.

The annual livestock judging contest for 4-H and FFA members will be Thursday morning at 9:00 a. m. This event draws judging teams from many parts of Oregon.

Swine and sheep showmanship will be judged on Thursday afternoon with J. E. Blinkhorn, Oregon City as judge.

Members Point To Contest For Coveted Trophy

4-H dairy club members from all parts of the county are putting the finishing touches on their animals this week in preparation for the county fair reports Joe Cox, County Extension Agent.

Most coveted award for dairy clubs is the calf manna trophy awarded annually for the past seventeen years by the Carnation Albers Co. A club must win the trophy three times to gain permanent possession. The Hillsboro Dairy Club has one leg on the cup at present.

Points considered in awarding the trophy are: 1. Per Cent exhibiting; 2. Judging contest scores; 3. Exhibit placings; 4. Demonstration team placings; 5. Showmanship; 6. Herdsman and 7. Fitting.

First club to gain permanent possession of a calf manna trophy was the Rock Creek Dairy Club who clinched it in 1939. The second cup was won permanently by Hillsboro Dairy Club in 1948.

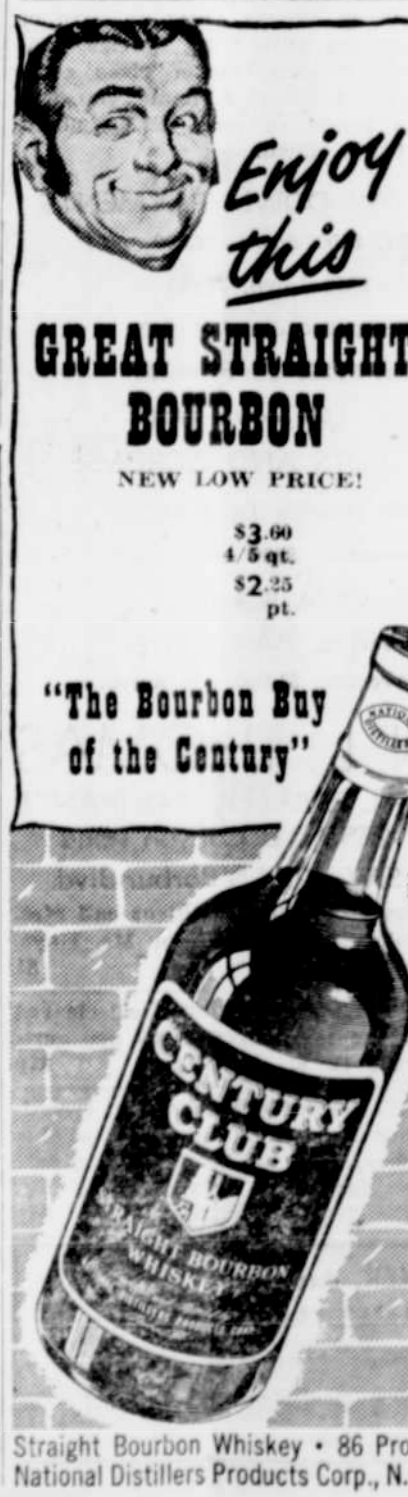
