Aloha Engineer Among '50 Grads Bonneville Staff

Donald J. Harris, Aloha, with a diploma from Montana State College, is one of 114 Pacific Northwest university and college engineering graduates of 1950 who are scheduled to play a major role in development of Columbia river power and transmission facilities, announces Paul J. Raver, Bonneville power administrator. Western schools have contributed nearly three-fourths of the technical and professional personnel of the administration.

"High standards maintained by engineering faculties of the west are making an important contribution to providing the Columbia river basin with one of the largest and best voltage transmission networks in the nation," Raver said.

Engineering graduates in turn have an opportunity to work with nationally known authorities in transmission line and substation design, system engineering, construction, testing and operations and maintenance, Raver pointed out.

Oregon State college contributed 49 graduates, with the University of Washington 22, Washington State College 7, University of Idaho 7, Montana State College 13, University of Portland 3, and Seattle University 2. Other schools include: M.I.T. (Portland) 2, Gonzaga, 3, University of California 5, and California Institute of Technology, 1.
