

AFTER NEARLY HALF CENTURY MUSICIAN REACHES AMBITION

SYLVAN—Jack Enzler, and Sylvan proudly claims him, is a musician, composer and good neighbor who has at last realized a life long ambition—to have his own band.

As for his life, it started in Switzerland in 1902. His father was in the army 25 years.

When young Jack was nine years old, after diligent practicing on the drum, he was allowed to play during the army drills. He remembers the hot attic where he tried to get as far away from family and neighbors as he could to practice.

In another year he traded his bicycle for a one-row button accordion and no one had to tell him to practice. He was told to stop.

When he was 20 he came to America with a group of 40 farmers who were all bound for the states to settle with relatives and friends. As his friends dropped off in New York, Chicago and San Francisco he stayed a few days in each city and after three weeks of traveling he arrived in Portland. At one of the good dairy farms of the area, Jack started to learn English and earn a living for three months.

He saw his first piano accordion in Portland and worked three years at the Jantzen Mills before he could earn enough to own one. At a Jantzen Christmas party he gave his first public concert which led to a new position at the Hazelwood bakery for a year and brought him his first pupils.

Then he was able to study and practice music for ten and twelve hours daily. About this time amateur shows gave him stage experience and many cash prizes.

From 1928 to 1940 Mr. Enzler managed an accordion school with

three assistant instructors, besides composing, arranging and directing three accordion bands.

With an incredible list of appearances on Portland broadcasting stations, banquets, clubs, fraternities, public and folk dances Mr. Enzler has also helped the Journal Juniors in their broadcasts and his junior accordion bands performed at their regular monthly shows in the public auditorium.

Adding incentive to ambition he married Esther Taeneler, of Portland, in 1934. Then Dolores was born May, 1936 and Gloria, in January, 1938, with Darlene in July, 1946. A fine band right in his own family but—they want to learn to play the piano—period.

Since they moved to their new "house that Jack built" a year ago, 1321 S. W. 61st drive, Dolores and Gloria have attended St. Mary's Academy of the Valley.

Such an active and strenuous musical program took a toll on Mr. Enzler's health resulting in retirement from teaching. He took a trip in 1947 to Switzerland to visit his father and two sisters, staying four months. Even there he was kept busy and toured sixteen states with a mixed chorus, as soloist.

The accordion is such a beloved instrument in Switzerland there is hardly a home without one and each town of 500 or more has an active music club and band.

With his good health regained he continued to compose and arrange music to build up the library for his band work. Now after four months of selecting five professional musicians playing the clarinet, saxophone, trumpet, accordion tuba and string bass, he has formed "Jack Enzler's Cosmopolitan Band."

He has arranged music "around the world" and hundreds of his own compositions representing thousands of hours of research to add to an extensive library with a promise of many more as they grow and become well known.

The slogan "Originating from the City of Roses" will be used as they tour to give a boost to the chamber of commerce "Greater Portland Campaign."

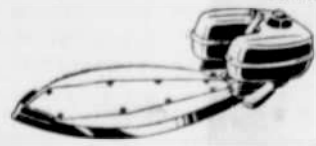

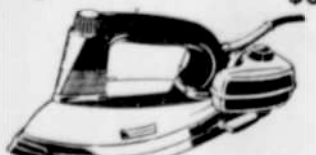
