Mr. and Mrs. Carl Rasmussen, of Rasmussen's Garage have moved into their new home recently purchased at Pinehurst.

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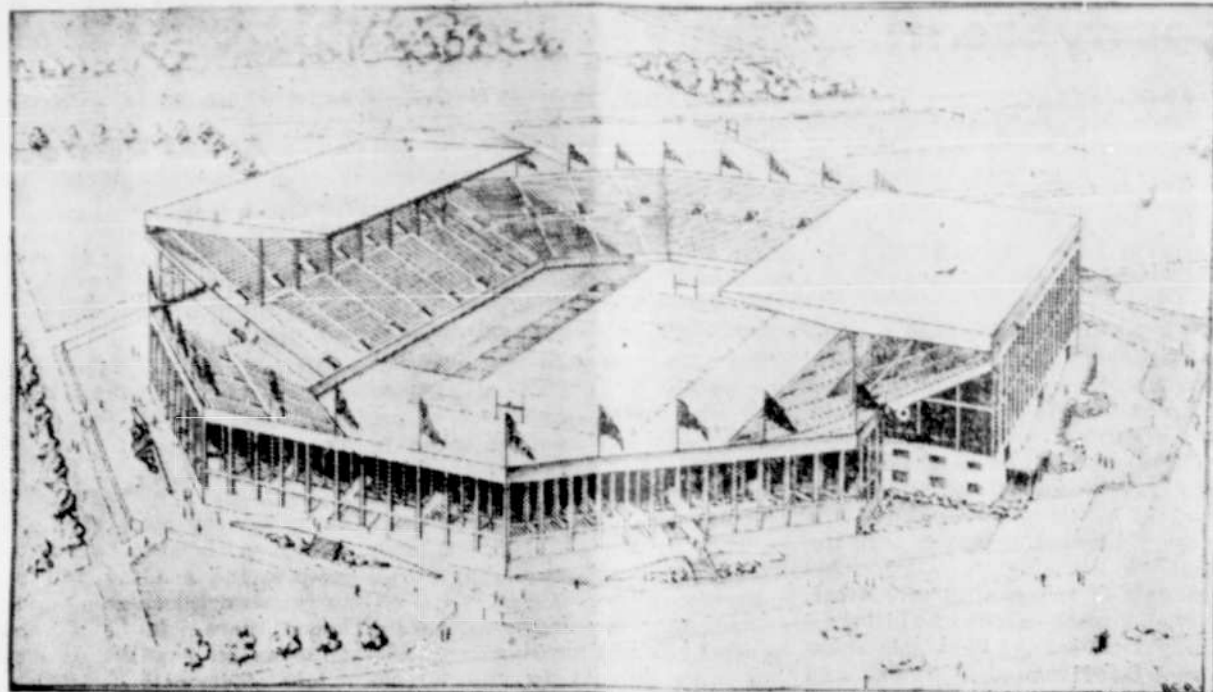
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OSC ALUMNI PROPOSE NEW FOOTBALL STADIUM



A STATEWIDE GIFT CAMPAIGN is being undertaken by alumni of Oregon State college who are seeking the erection of a new football stadium.

Accompanying architect's drawing shows the completed stadium with 62,000 seating capacity.

According to Charles T. Parker, Portland, chairman of the stadium executive committee of the alumni association, the new facility will be constructed in three phases. First objective is permanent grandstands on either side of the field, one with roof, to give a seating capacity of 35,000 with end-zone bleachers.

When funds and demand warrant it, the capacity

will be first expanded to 49,000, with a second roof. Final phase will be the all-concrete stands to accommodate 62,000.

Present Bell field stadium, of frame and temporary construction and dedicated in 1921, is considered beyond the stage of rebuilding. Three years ago, the wooden east stands were declared unsafe and replaced by temporary bleachers.

Present stadium site is needed for other purposes. The state board of higher education has provided a new site, south of the new coliseum, but funds for actual construction must come only from gift sources, college officials point out.
