SYLVAN, (Special)—While school is the greatest bit of every-day business for youngsters of the community, parents so often miss out in what goes on. But one day in school, visiting all class-rooms and discussing plans with the various teachers and pupils gives an insight into the methods of education today.

For miles around Sylvan school buses gather pupils and this year the last bell rings at 9:15 to accommodate the increased numbers.

The bulletin board in the entrance hall urges new members to the school orchestra directed by Mr. Milton Dunham.

Around in the new wing is the eighth grade room where Mrs. Agnes Swift calls for reports on their trip to the State Fair which all fifteen pupils took together. This year they will learn to sell advertisements for the "Sylvan Log", school paper the class edits.

The modern single unit desks and seats are in both the eighth and seventh grade rooms and here is where Mrs. Roy Mosner has a panel discussion on Korea with her 20 students.

Miss Ella Liddel is welcoming Mexican articles from sombrero to pottery for study and appreciation of our Southern neighbor. The twins, Charles and Jim Meadows are among the 26 sixth grade students.

Mrs. Rae Richardson and 21 fifth graders are studying the important rivers of the United States and the twins Carmen and Carol Guy insist that the Willamette is one of them.

Mrs. Emma Wargi has half of the 36 fourth graders and puts her girls and the upper classes through their paces in physical education in the splendid new gymnasium equipped with new showers and dressing rooms.

Mt. Rushmore Marble Mover Joins L-C College

LEWIS AND CLARK COLLEGE (Special)—Classes opened September 18 with an enrollment expected to reach 1200 by the end of the week. A slight drop from September last year was attributed by college officials to draft status of many men students.

Ready to meet classes were 17 new additions to the faculty. Administrative positions are being filled by Dr. Vergil Fogdall, former dean of men's affairs at University of Oregon, who is new dean of students at Lewis and Clark. 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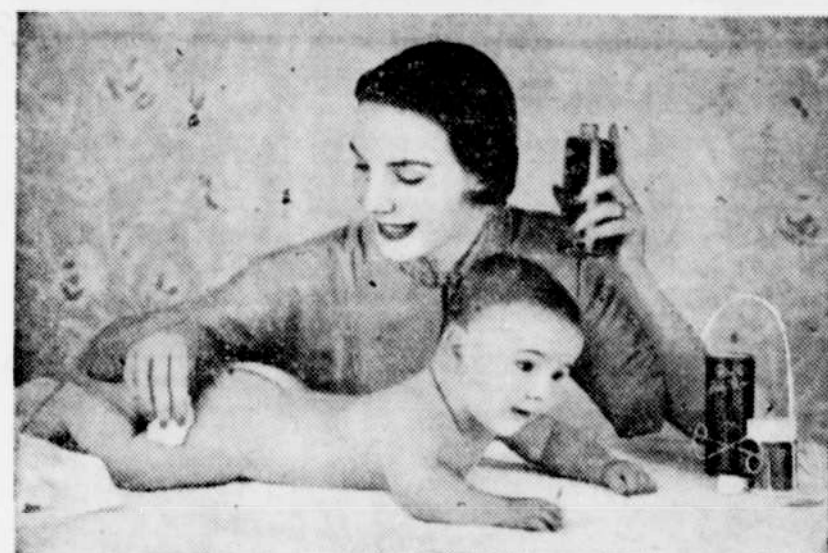
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
