

FIVE WEEK SUMMER TRIP OF 6,000 MI. A DREAM COME TRUE

Mrs. Al Beguin of 1552 N. Center St., Beaverton, Ore., with sons Larry and Steve, and mother-in-law, Mrs. Blanche Beguin enjoyed a five weeks trip this summer that had been a dream for a good long time. They covered 6000 miles in this time, leaving Portland Aug. 3, and arriving home early Labor Day.

Traveling east, first, the party made a brief visit in Idaho Falls, Idaho to relatives, and then proceeded to Yellowstone Park where they were entranced by the many geysers, colored pools, hot springs, mud pots, many falls and breath-taking scenery.

Leaving by the south entrance they journeyed through Grand Teton Nat. Park of very high sharp rock mountains with Jackson Lake stretching out in front and on south west to Salt Lake City.

Here a dip in the lake was enjoyed and they visited the Mormon Temple Square and Bingham copper mine, biggest in the world, as well as other points of interest. Proceeding still south they made a brief stay at Bryce Canyon, which impressed them as very unique and under advertised, then Zion Nat. Park.

Going through Las Vegas, Nev., they stopped for an inspection of Hoover (Boulder) Dam, the world's highest, and descended in an elevator from the dam's crest 528 ft. to view the world's largest power plant.

Leaving here they pressed on to Grand Canyon Nat. Park and then on south, visiting the Wupotki Indian Ruins, and Montezuma castle cliff dwellings in Ariz. Further south they drove into Wickenburg, Ariz., where a stay was enjoyed with Mr. Beguin's brother, Dave.

Having a well here, in this vast desert, quantities of melons were available and consumed and of course the boys spent a great deal of their time swimming—temperatures over 104 during the stay.

Proceeding through Phoenix and Yuma (117°) the group arrived in San Diego, Calif., where a day was spent in San Diego Zoo of Balboa Park, 4th largest in U. S., all located in a beautiful outdoor setting. From here a trip was taken into Mexico.

Traveling north they visited Palomar astronomical observatory, noted for its 200 in. mirror lens, largest in the world, and then three very old historical missions, Pala, San Luis Rey, and outstandingly landscaped San Juan Capistrano.

Continuing up the coast through forests of oil derricks a visit was made in Los Angeles with another

brother of Mr. Beguin's, Glen. Here Mr. Beguin joined his family flying in from Portland on a United Airlines plane.

After a trip to Knott's Berry Farm and Ghost Town, Forest Lawn, Tar Pits, numerous parks and buildings, the beaches, Hollywood and with the boys seeing Roy Rogers and other stars in a mammoth benefit rodeo, the party of five started north up the coast. Then heading inland they briefly took in Sequoia Park, where the world's oldest and biggest tree grows, 36.5 ft. in diameter, 272 ft. high, it is between 3500 and 4000 years old, and Yosemite Park of the beautiful valley and falls.

In San Francisco, a tour was taken which included Golden Gate Park, Fisherman's Wharf, Chinatown, Ferry Bldg., Mission Delores, both the bay and Golden Gate bridges, cable cars, and a view of the whole bay and city from Coit Tower, Telegraph Hill as well as Alcatraz Island.

Visiting the petrified forests and steam geysers they continued north through the magnificent Redwoods where the "tallest" tree of 345 ft. is located, and on home.

Truly a dream trip it will dwell in the back of their minds to recall and enjoy for a long time.

Jr. High School Leading Topic At P.T.A. Meeting

CEDAR MILL — "The Junior High School in Our School System" constituted the subject of a talk by Don Campbell, superintendent of school at Park Rose at the PTA meeting Sept. 28 at the school.

He stated that only in the past two years has it been possible for union high school districts to include a junior high program.

Junior highs have generally come about because of overcrowded conditions and because it has been found that segregating age groups is advantageous, he added.

The pertinence of the problem being faced in many areas surrounding Portland is beginning to make people aware of the advisability of junior high programs.

The union high school district boards have been empowered to add one grade at a time downward providing the people approve of such action necessitating any changes to go through high school rather than elementary school hands.

The Dr. Holy report and some of its recommendations were explained by Mr. Campbell.

"Safety" will be stressed during the year to children through var-

ied safety pictures and programs according to Al N. French, safety chairman.

He urged parents to constantly remind their children of need for safety on the highway in walking to and from school.

Room representatives will cooperate with teachers and parents to have potluck dinners for parents of each room individually. Purpose of the dinners will be to get parents and teachers acquainted after which parents will visit children's rooms for a back-to-school program and introduction to curriculum.

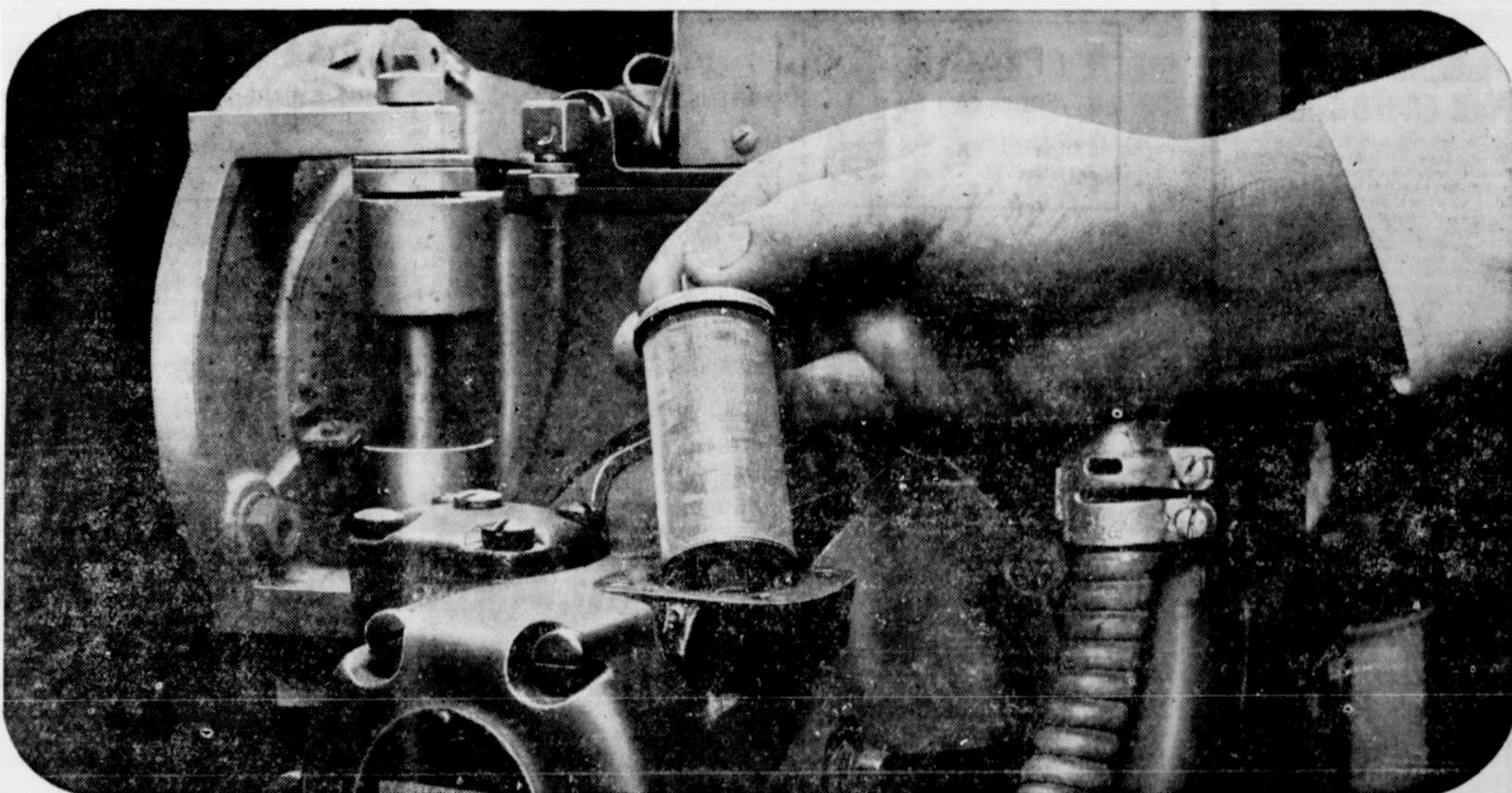
Initiation will be held and Commander Milton Keyser's wife is the candidate.

Mr. and Mrs. Guy Gramling have sold their home on Watson and will move into their new home which they recently built on Farmington road.

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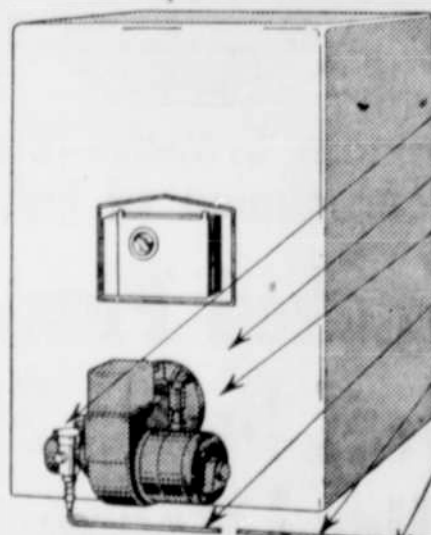
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
