

FULL HOUSE GREET'S SATURDAY 'NEIGHBORHOOD CAPERS' OF PTA

CEDAR MILL—A full house was on hand at the new Cedar Mill school auditorium gymnasium Saturday night for the PTA sponsored "Neighbors Capers" vaudeville program.

The second half of the program included an act by "Waldo" the magician from Metzger; song and dance by Joan Olson; baton twirling by Beverly Dean, Miss Portland of 1949; impersonations by Venetia Crane; harmonies by the Harmaniacs, a trio of harmonica players including John Dunn, Stan Barrett and Pete Milton of Portland and ballads by Wilton Sloum, director of music at First Congregational Church in Portland and soloist with Portland Symphony.

A finale with the cast and audience singing "God Bless America" concluded the program. Master of ceremonies was Lloyd and stage hand was Leonard Uppinghouse.

It was voted to purchase siding and have it put on the church.

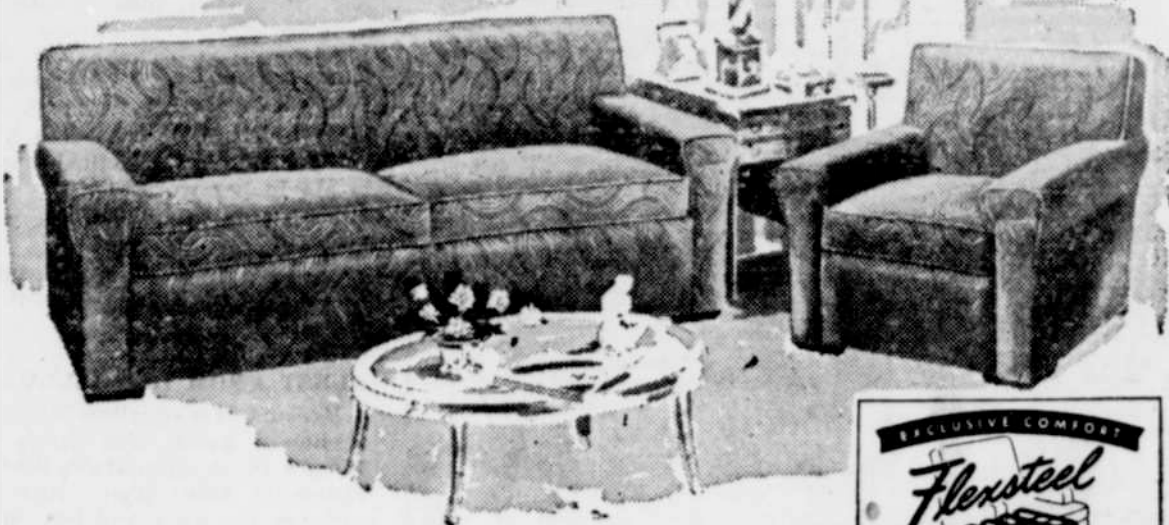
RUSH APPENDECTOMY
