

## PROFESSOR EMPHASIZES NEED OF UNDERSTANDING NEIGHBORS

CEDAR MILL—Need for a common understanding with Central American countries was strongly pointed out by Dr. R. M. Hooker, professor of Spanish and Political Science at Pacific University, Forest Grove, when he appeared with a panel of students Thursday evening October 12 before the Cedar Mill Community Club at its meeting at Sunset Valley school.

Dr. Hooker and a group of 20 students from Pacific University traveled through Central America last summer on a goodwill and educational tour. Five students appeared on the panel with him at the meeting.

Robert Burkhalter, had as his topic, "Rolling South to Nicaragua". He related experiences of the group in five new cars as they traveled via Mexico, San Salvador,

Guatemala and other points of interest visited.

The second to speak was Evelyn Wilson describing the buying and selling in the countries with their market places at which dickerings plays an important part in making purchases.

Charles White had as his topic, "Education in Central America". He pointed out that schools were under federal control. Architecture of buildings was of interest with mention of ultra modern design in newer buildings. A high level of education is attained by many especially the upper class.

Joe Kirkbride mentioned as his topic the power of the press relating that it is controlled by the government with a communistic side of the news being printed.

Patricia Breunbach spoke of the people and their needs pointing out the importance of contact with American people, as well as the need for a higher standard of living; a need for missionaries and teachers and a need to be understood.

Dr. Hooker commended the Rockefeller Foundation and Carnegie Fund of the United States for their efforts in bringing up health and living standards but said there is still much to be done. He stated that in some ways Latin America is advanced more than the U. S. and in other ways more retarded.

Appearing during the business session were Carl Piacentini of Lewis and Clark college and Errol Hassel, Superintendent of schools at Beaverton with information on the Basic School Increase Support Bill.

Work parties were enlisted for the Scout Cabin and Cedar Mill School Park areas. A report of progress on shrubbery and landscaping at Sunset Valley school assured planting in near future. Approval was given for purchasing signs warning motorists of children playing in the area and purchasing and installation of backstops for ball parks at Sunset Valley and Cedar Mill schools.

Mrs. F. R. Young was named as chairman for the Sunshine committee. A nominating committee to select nominees for officers to be reported at the November meeting was named as follows: A. N.

French, Carl Breuchert, Dr. J. R. Woodmansee, Mrs. F. R. Young and Mrs. Clifford Martin.
